Meghan's Musings

Walking into the Darkness of Grief

We have entered the season of Easter. The season in which we celebrate new life, Christ's triumph over death, God's promise coming true in the Resurrection. And yet, I am acutely aware that many among us are not in an Easter season in our lives. Many are still in the Garden of Gethsemane, on Golgotha, or in the tomb. So I'd like to share an excerpt, a version of which often appears in my funeral meditations. You might have heard it before. You might hear it again. But I think it bears repeating each time any among us come face-to-face with loss.

In the days and weeks immediately following the death of a loved one, those closest to the one who is lost have already been through some very painful, dark days. I wish I could say it will all get better from there on out, but I know that isn't true. There will be more painful, dark days ahead. Jerry Sittser, a religion professor who suffered sudden, great loss authored the book, *A Grace Disguised* in which he used the analogy of sunlight and dark circling the Earth. Imagine the globe as seen from outer space, it turns and sunlight crosses the hemisphere east to west, followed by darkness east to west. At the time of loss, we face the dark, like twilight. And our instinct may be to try to outrun the dark, run west as fast as possible so the dark won't catch up with us. But we can't outrun the dark and attempting to do so only makes us more anxious and tired, and in the dark that much longer. The only way to get through the dark is to face it, to walk east, into it. And eventually, you will come out on the other side. Eventually, the sun will rise.

This is not to say it will be easy, neither Sittser nor I would imply such a thing. This is not to say "everything will go back to normal." Indeed, life will never be the same. But you will find your new stride. You will establish a new normal. The sun will rise. Although no amount of time will completely erase your pain, if together family and friends share remembrances, they can find comfort and strength, making it easier to accept this loss that is now a part of our lives. We all know there is no right way to say farewell to someone for whom we care so deeply. There are as many ways to grieve as there are people who grieve and people for whom we grieve. It is my hope that, however we walk this path of grief, we will support one another and lift one another up.

And remember, never forget: the sun will rise.

A Lenten Journey Another Type of Mission

I love to travel. I treasure opportunities to enrich my life by expanding my horizons. When I hear "the Lenten season" or "life" described as a journey, I smile and reflect on all I have learned during trips I have taken.

I recently went to a new destination with a traveling companion. We went to the Central lowa Shelter and Services center in Des Moines and my friend began her stay at this facility for homeless adults after a combination of difficulties made it impossible for her to live independently. I dreaded making that trip, not knowing what to expect but anticipating the worst. I was determined to remain positive and supportive, but there was concern and fear for her well-being in the pit of my stomach as we entered the building.

What we found was another learning experience in my journey. The reception area looked and sounded like semi-controlled chaos at times but the employees were patient and attentive as my friend asked and answered questions. Learning about resources available to residents, I began to hope this could become an opportunity for my friend to connect with programs to help her address some of the challenges in her life. The shelter was relatively clean, the safety of residents was obviously a high priority, and the lack of privacy will (I hope) be balanced with the companionship of other residents (and the dogs that belong to some of them!).

The shelter is not a church-related program but I saw God's presence there. I heard God's love in the voices of the persons helping with the intake process; I witnessed the ministry of service extended to persons considered outcasts by much of our society; I felt the relief of knowing that my friend has a bed in a warm place with food and water available. An important lesson for us all to learn – God travels with us, wherever we go. When we trust that God is present, we can have confidence that blessings will be found. Thanks be to God!

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of January were \$12,270. This was \$1,750 above budget for the month. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$2,062 for the month, which is \$1,326 above budget. We collected \$3,040 in per capita donations, bringing our total to \$3,780. In total for the month, expenses were \$219 over budget.

Year-to-date through February, pledges are \$6,832 over budget and expenses are \$682 over budget.

The Muñozes fund received church member donations of \$350 for El Salvador graduate gifts and a \$100 donation from the Deacon fund.

Work Week heads to AMEN St. Louis

This year our intergenerational group will be going to AMEN St. Louis for Work Week. The dates are July 31 to August 6. The trip will be limited to 18 people, and half of the spots have been spoken for. We are again partnering with the Brooklyn Presbyterian church and we have been informed that at least 4 are going from their church.

Have you always thought about going on Work Week? Perhaps this is the year for you. Though we have been doing this special mission trip for nearly 30 years, there may be some who aren't familiar with the makeup. Work Week is open to males and females, young and old alike. The only stipulation regarding age is the youngest youth must be entering 9th grade in the fall. The attendees are required to attend an informational meeting, and covenant meetings that are held once a month. Help with all fundraisers is also a requirement and everyone is expected to pay a participation fee.

We travel as a group and stay at the facility provided by our hosts. Adults with carpentry skills serve as the mentors for others in the group. Depending on the work we are doing, other adults may find themselves in the teaching position. The work we do is assigned by our hosts, and we always hope that jobs will allow us to work as a group. There may be times, however, when we will be divided into smaller groups to accomplish tasks given.

Our days consist of breakfast, devotions, packing a sack lunch, working at the site in the morning and afternoon and eating lunch at the site. Upon returning for the evening, the night meal is prepared, clean-up is done and we have devotions before ending the day. The various tasks are divided up so everyone gets the opportunity of fixing meals, sharing a devotion, cleaning bathrooms or vehicles and doing clean-up.

AMEN|Saint Louis is a ministry of Oak Hill Presbyterian Church located in the Tower Grove South Neighborhood of St. Louis, MO. Through congregational fundraising and generous grants, Oak Hill Presbyterian Church (PCUSA) was able to launch **AMEN** and begin its life as a ministry embracing the neighborhood. The house at 4115 Connecticut Street directly adjoins the 4111 Connecticut church building.

Some work opportunities we might be involved in are:

- * Isaiah 58 Ministries is a cooperative ministry on the near south side of St. Louis. Since 1970 it has been dedicated to helping neighbors in the city through many varied services. In all its work AMEN strives to show people that they are accepted for who they are and where they are in life, that they can work towards changing their current situation, and that Christian love is best expressed through actions, not simply words.
- * St. Patrick Center provides opportunities for self-sufficiency and dignity to people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Individuals and families build permanent, positive change in their lives through safe and affordable housing, sound mental and physical health, and employment and financial stability.
- * **Gateway Greening Community gardens** improve the appearance of neighborhoods and inspire, educate and reflect the pride of their participants. They come in many shapes and sizes: community vegetable gardens, tree and shrub plantings, native gardens, perennial beds, street beautification or even innovative designs created by community groups themselves.
- * St. Louis area foodbank. Since 2010, the St. Louis Area Foodbank has delivered 3000 "Senior Food Boxes" each month to member agencies in Madison and St. Clair Counties in Illinois, which are then directly distributed to low-income seniors. These boxes are built by our volunteers, with food provided by the USDA, specially chosen for its high nutritional value for seniors.

Remember, we have to limit the number that can attend and about half of the spots are already spoken for. If interested, please attend the information meeting after church on April 10.
