

"Meghan's Musings"

Sacred Stuff

George Carlin used to do a great bit about the difference between "stuff" and "junk" (except, of course, he used a different word instead of "junk"). Other people's stuff is "junk" and our own junk is "stuff." As in, "Get your junk out of this closet so I have a place to put my stuff."

Moving forces us to think about our stuff. And in the moving process some of our "stuff" becomes junk we're forced to get rid of. Personally, I have way too much stuff and always have. I'm only partly joking when I say that I'm a borderline hoarder. Despite my attachment to stuff that makes it difficult for me to let go, at the end of the day, I do know and believe that it is just stuff. But some stuff is more than just stuff. Some stuff has deeper significance. Some stuff is sacred.

Unfortunately, it was my sacred stuff from my church office that got the roughest treatment from the movers who did my packing for the move. My stoles were wadded up and used as packing material. Angel figurines and other fragile items were shoved into book boxes with no protection. And worst of all, a communion set was also packed in a book box. Miraculously, the plate was unharmed but the chalice—which was not only amongst books but had books set on top of it—not surprisingly broke at the stem. My heart sank when I discovered the chalice. It was a gift from a seminary friend who had it specially made for me when we were in seminary (i.e. poor) and it is essentially irreplaceable. Many have noted that it could be glued back together. Perhaps. But even so, it would never be useable for communion for fear that it would break again and make a huge mess.

Of course the chalice, one of the few things I own that is irreplaceable, is the one thing to be destroyed. Over the course of the week that found my chalice broken, the world was shattered by devastating violence: a civilian plane shot down in Ukraine, fighting between Israel and Hamas injuring and killing civilians of all ages, the humanitarian crisis with refugee children fleeing drug violence in Central America is just a start to an endless list of the suffering and crises plaguing the world. Many within our own church family have been rocked by personal crises, illness and deaths of loved ones, families in turmoil, friends and family members secretly fighting demons we may never even know.

And I realized that the chalice—is just stuff. I'm not going to try to glue it together. I'm going to keep it, as is, broken in two. A symbol of our brokenness. Our broken relationships with God. Our broken relationships with one another. Our inner brokenness. And yet in that brokenness is Grace. The cup will most likely never again be filled with communion wine but it is already, now and always filled and overflowing with air. The same air that gives us life. Just as our brokenness is filled to overflowing with Grace, God's love, God's promise, the hope of the Resurrection , the promise of God's Reign bursting through into our world.

P.S. Speaking of sacred stuff, many have asked about the fire truck on one of my stoles. It is common at ordinations to have people present the ordinand with sacred stuff, symbols of ministry such as the robe, stole, communion elements, etc. At my ordination, I had my then three year-old nephew present me with a fire truck both to remind me of the importance of the children in our midst and to remind me that "some days are for playing" (which is a piece of art you will see in my office whenever my art gets up on my walls). The stole was made by a member of my first church and she added the fire truck to the other symbols of the church.

Pledges for the month of June were \$11,371. This was \$533 below budget. Other Regular Giving for the month is \$710, which is just \$29 below budget. Total expenses are \$48 under budget. Year-to-date pledges are \$1,513 higher than budgeted and year-to-date expenses are \$608 under budget.

Memorial money received by the church and designated for the Foundation was transferred to the Foundation in the amount of \$2,125. Our One Great Hour offering was remitted to Presbytery. Work Week received income from the ice cream social and paid expenses related to the ice cream social and upcoming trip.

Work Week 2014

Another successful Work Week is behind us and as normally is the case, those of us who went on the trip came home with more than what we gave. The town of Winnebago is not very large, about the size of Sully. Our first night was spent in the normal fashion of becoming acquainted with our housing arrangements, setting up air mattresses, eating and going to a grocery store, in South Sioux City, NE about 17 miles away.

Sunday morning found us attending the adult Sunday school class that was taught by Rev. Lowell TenClay, our host for the week. The class was made up of Mrs. TenClay (Connie) and 3 other Native American women. We had been asked to help with the service on Sunday. Josh Ventling, Garrett Sturtz, Rev. Meghan and Rev. John all participated by leading responsive readings, and all of us sang one of our Work Week songs during the taking up of the offering. Approximately 20 people attended the church service that morning, which included the 12 of us.

Following lunch, Rev. TenClay gave us a tour of Winnebago, including going to their site for the Pow Wow which would be taking place July 24-27. We also saw the many government built homes that were in need of repairs to house the homeless living on the reservation. The Native American hospital located in Winnebago, is more of a holding place. Once a patient is stable enough to be moved, they are taken to Sioux City.

Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday were our work days. Under the guidance of Tony Hillpiper, Dana's son-in-law from Brooklyn, the young men in the group tore off shingles and paper on a 2-car garage. Then the rotten boards were replaced and new paper and shingles were installed. This took them the first three work days.

The females did a lot of weeding in gardens and flower gardens, as well as mowing lawns, weed eating, scraping paint, cleaning gutters, and picking up trash and brush. These tasks took place at the home of a missionary, who was half Native American and the owner of the garage with the new roof, an elderly couple that are members of the church, the actual church, and a park just up the hill from the TenClay's home. This park was the former site of the Presbyterian church in Winnebago.

On Friday, part of the group painted most of the inside of a home for a Native American family. The rest of the group went to a home where repairs were done to a deck and it was made ready for the addition of a ramp.

We want to thank all of you for your support, either with prayers or monetarily. As is normally the case, we came home with more, than what we felt we gave to the Native Americans in Winnebago, Nebraska.
