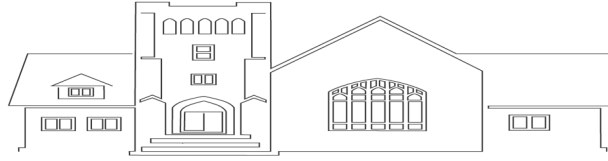

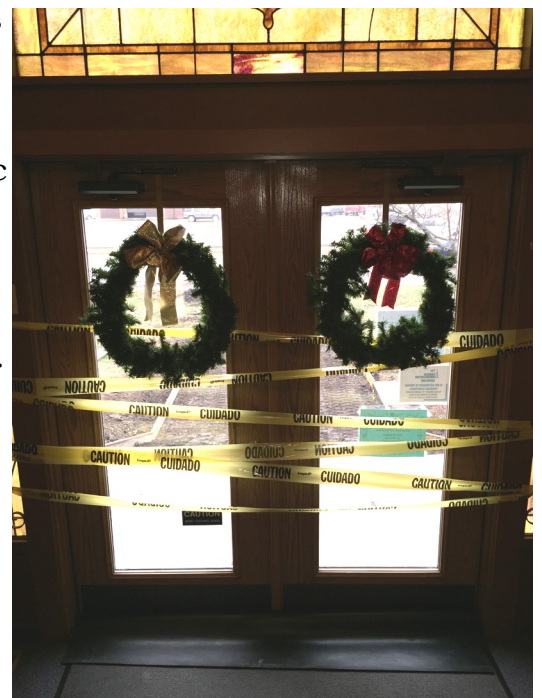
Meghan's Musings

Learning to Love Even the Banana Lovers

A couple weeks ago, my dear five year-old nephew told my mother, “I love you even though you love bananas and I hate them.” And once again, a young child speaks the words the world needs to hear.

It's been quite a year. A long drawn-out political season that seemed like it would never end finally did. But the peace and tranquility, the return to civility we all crave still alludes us. And without diminishing the concerns of anyone on any “side” of the political spectrum, it's good to remember that at the end of the day, there is only one “side” and that side is God's side. And being on God's side, requires remembering that everyone else—no matter what their political or religious beliefs, no matter how unpleasant their way of expressing themselves may be to us, regardless of all else—we are all Beloved Children of God. Even people who love bananas if we hate them.

Today several people worked together to decorate the church for the seasons of Advent and Christmas. (Thank you, people!) And this year we have a new feature in our decorating: The yellow caution tape on the front doors preventing us from using the still-under-construction front steps. Our church decorators saw fit not to let the less than aesthetically pleasing caution tape stop them from hanging the customary wreaths and it strikes me as entirely appropriate for Advent: a liturgical season that begins with apocalyptic imagery and calls to repentance. The season of Advent should not be entered lightly, anticipating and working for the Reign of Christ should not be entered lightly. Yellow caution tape is called for in our world, in our church and in partnering with God. It's risky business. But the risk is worth it because the Hope, Love, Peace and Joy of Advent leads to the beauty of God's promise coming to fruition in the birth of Jesus our Messiah. May it be so in our lives, may it be so in our church and may it be so in our world.

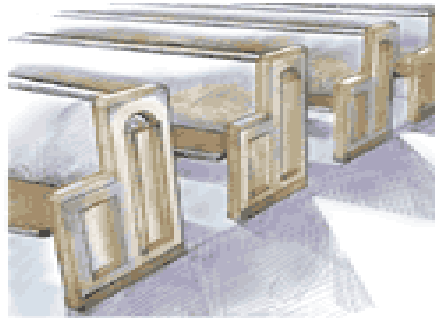

View from the Pews

In our very first “View From the Pews,” we take a minute to learn more about Wendell Wendt – First Presbyterian’s eldest member. My interview with him was inspiring – Wendell remembers his life in incredible detail, and I was struck by his compassion and wit. Hopefully you all get a chance to talk with him as well.

Wendell was born in Avoca, IA on December 20, 1914. An only child, Wendell was raised Presbyterian; so naturally he became a member here at First Pres only one short month after moving to Newton in 1948. Always interested in journalism, he first studied at Drake, and eventually moved here to work at the Newton Daily News. He started as an Office Manager, and 38 short years later retired as Assistant Publisher. Retirement meant a new chapter of service, and he began volunteering at First Presbyterian Church with Christian education and other administration roles through the years.

With him every step of the way was his life’s partner Loretta. Meeting at Avoca High School (Loretta graduated 2nd in their class, Wendell 4th ... direct quote: “I should’ve tried harder”), they both went to Drake as well. In college, Wendell contracted nephritis, and was given only a 2% chance to live. Surviving and then graduating, Wendell and Loretta reconnected and started dating after she called him on a Friday night. They hit it off, but their relationship was put on hold when he was drafted into the Army during WWII. Taking advantage of his leave, they were married in Camp Crowder, MO on May 15, 1943.

Returning home after the war, Wendell and Loretta looked forward to their life together, and just two years later they had moved to Newton. Wendell and Loretta would go on to have two daughters, Marti and Catherine, both of whom were baptized in, and members of First Presbyterian Church.

I’m grateful for the opportunity to have had Wendell as the first “View From the Pews” member. It was an honor and privilege to get to know him better.

At our last meeting we discussed:

*Advent, which begins on Sunday, November 27. Ann Cutts has contacted families who will be doing the Advent candle lighting during the Sunday services during Advent.

*Decorating the church. This was done by Linda Kirchhoff's bible group the week between November 20 and November 27.

*Poinsettias. An order form will be inserted in the bulletin each Sunday during Lent. See further details on page 4.

*Christmas Pageant. Meghan reported that this will be held on December 18 during worship. More details will follow.

*Blue Christmas Service. Meghan will be leading a special service on Thursday, December 22 at 7 pm. This will be a special service for people struggling during the Christmas season. (See more information about it in a separate article on page 5.)

*Christmas Eve Service. We recommended to Session that the time for this be changed from 7:30 to 7 pm. This was approved. We will work out the details at our December committee meeting.

Mission Committee

Mission Accounts: Marilyn brought an overall financial report showing all accounts for the church so we could determine what we might need for our budget requests for 2017. There were three items listed under Missions.

Reports:

Budgeting for 2017:

*Presbytery General Mission – We recommend that Session round up our church's contribution to \$5000.

*We recommend that Budget and Finance ask members to pay their own per capita amount again this year. The amount is \$40 per member.

*Request that the Compañeros line item (now at \$400) be removed from the budget.

*Muñoces/Compañeros/El Salvador – The letter is done that is to be signed by church members and will be translated and taken to Muñoces. It appears that people have forgotten about this, so Marilyn will take it to Session for them to sign and then will have the interest group sign it and then have the church members reminded that the letter is available for signatures.

*Fall Fashion Show – It appears we made approximately \$1000. The charges for groceries have not been paid yet, so the exact figure is not known yet.

Mission Coalition:

*Crop Walk donations from our church were \$145. Overall, there was \$4,470.50 collected this year, however, the average for the last 5 years has been \$5500. Discussions will be held by the Mission Coalition group on how this will be handled in future years. An observation Linda Curtis-Stolper had was with the St. Stephen's group. They had the most walkers and the most money. Their church matched the amount of money each walker was able to collect.

*Pie Sale at McCann Center resulted in 73 pies that were sold at \$10 each, so \$730 was raised.

*Salvation Army Bell Ringing will be December 3 for our church. We have been assigned 10 am to 2 pm at Farver's True Value. There is a sign-up chart on our bulletin board in Fellowship Hall. Members can sign up for ½ hour or 1 hour times of ringing the bells.

*Presbyterian Women held their Fall meeting, which Barb Taylor attended. She was one of the presenters.

*South Sudan Interest Group - Six members of our congregation went to Omaha to hear Bangasi Joseph Bakosoro, the former Governor of the state of Western Equatoria, South Sudan. All the information was overwhelming to take in. The group met with Lawrence Kenyi after church on November 13. It may be that the South Sudan group in Des Moines may be on the opposing side of the fighting from the group in . Also, in looking through the Presbyterian Women information, it was noted they have a connection with South Sudan, but we don't know which group. A lot more research will need to be done before our church will be able to say how we might help.

*Days for Girls International Workshop – Twelve volunteers joined together Friday, November 18 to create the three pieces of the sustainable feminine hygiene kits. A kit helps a girl continue in school when she normally would have had to spend a week each month confined to her home. Donations of colorful 100% cotton material (quilter's cotton or similar to) including flannels are needed. The next scheduled workshop is Thursday, January 26 from 9 am to 3 pm in the Fellowship Hall. All are welcome to participate in this great mission project.

Opportunities to Give:

*We approved a donation of \$100.00 to the Salvation Army for what is thought of as traditional Thanksgiving meal items for individuals and families in need.

*Progress Industries Clients: Names were available on November 21. These will be on the bulletin board in the Narthex, giving the clients name and gift requests, as well as the date the gifts are due back.

*Salvation Army Angels – We voted to do this again this year, but only get 25 angels. When those are gone, we will not get more, as we have several opportunities for giving this year.

*Christmas Joy Offering – This offering will be taken up on December 25.

*Mission Giving Catalog - See page 4 for information on this.

*Palestine Craft Sale – Liz Knott, who is a retired minister in our Presbytery, heads up this mission. Liz came to our church on November 27 to explain the purpose of this. She also brought items available for purchase that day. We plan to purchase any left over items and hold a bazaar in Fellowship Hall during Advent.

Emergency Closure of the Church

With the arrival of winter weather, we have reviewed and updated our policies at First Presbyterian. In the event of severe weather, any changes to scheduled activities at the church will be communicated to KCOB Radio. They have assured us such information will be sent out over all 3 of their stations (1280 AM, 95.9 FM and KRTI 106.7 FM which covers Grinnell, Marshalltown, parts of Des Moines, etc.) In addition we have established an account with KCCI Television and WHO Radio. When severe weather occurs, check these sources. If First Presbyterian is not mentioned on any of these, then there is no change in our plans. However, if you have any doubts, please err on the side of caution and be safe!

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of October were \$10,591. This was \$71 above budget for the month. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$1,370 for the month, which is \$634 above budget. In total for the month, expenses were \$21 below budget.

Year-to-date through October, pledges are \$3,740 over budget and expenses are \$1,237 over budget.

Activity included:

- *The Mission - International Fund disbursed \$145 for the Crop Walk donations from our church members.
- *The Mission - Local Fund paid \$41.23 for style show expenses.
- *The Sundays at 4 paid \$100 to Davis Folkerts for his October organ concert.
