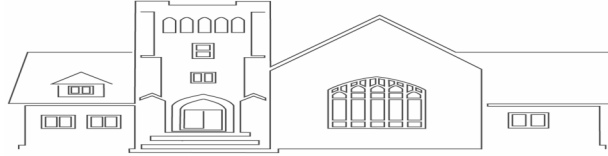

Meghan's Musings

Of Water Bottles and Martini Glasses

As some of you know, I'm the moderator of the Compassion, Peace and Justice task force of the Presbytery of Des Moines. Last week, at the end of our meeting when I asked if there was any other business, one of the members of the committee said that he had a very important personal question he needed to ask me. He wanted to know if I tie my water bottle to my back bumper and drag it behind me as I drive; and if not, what on earth have I done to it to cause its current condition? Now, if that seems like an odd question for him to ask, you probably have not seen my red water bottle.

I have three well-worn water bottles. All have shown the wear and tear of years of service but my red water bottle does look like it's been through a lot. The paint is chipping off at the bottom and all around the top where it curves, where there are also a couple good sized dings. The truth is, I'm not even sure *exactly* what has happened to my water bottle. I'm sure the dings are from being dropped, often on concrete, once or twice or a hundred times. I suppose the paint chipping off is just regular wear and tear (as I mentioned, I've had this bottle for longer than I can even say). But I do know that it's still perfectly functional. And I know that if I'd drunk the equivalent amount of water out of single use plastic bottles, that would have been a *lot* of plastic which, for a multitude of reasons, is bad for our environment. And so, while my water bottle's prettiest days are far behind it, if it still works, why replace it?

On the other hand, while my mother was here, she was freshening up a flower arrangement in my house and she placed a flower bud in a cool martini glass she found in my cupboard. I have also had the martini glass for many years, probably even longer than the water bottle, but the glass is in great shape. It should be: it's hardly been used! And as I was washing the glass to put it away, I had a tinge of guilt: why do I keep this thing that I never use? I really like it, it's a great design but—if I don't use it, why keep it? (I have this inner dialog every time I move so, who knows, maybe it won't make the cut for the next move?)

It seems to me that our faith, our spiritual lives, our walk with God and one another, ought to be more like the well-used, well-worn water bottle than the cool but rarely-sees-the-light-of-day martini glass. What does that mean? I leave it up to you to ponder what that means in your own life, but for me, it means allowing my faith to be an everyday primary facet of my life, not just something to take out and dust off on rare special occasions.

REPORT ON PRESBYTERY

The May 17, 2016 meeting of Presbytery took place at Union Park Presbyterian Church in Des Moines. It is a small, well kept brick church in a modest neighborhood on the northeast side of Des Moines.

Presbytery always starts with a worship service that is very similar to one we would have in our own churches. It is very interesting to see how it is approached in each situation. The sermon in this case was delivered by a woman from Sudan who is a CRE but is studying to become a Presbyterian minister. Although it was a little difficult to understand all words at times due to her accent, she gave a very good sermon and I was very impressed with her delivery.

The one agenda item that probably took the longest was the hiring of an interim General Presbyter to replace Phil Barrett, who retired in January. His name is Rev. James Koopman. He is actually a minister of the Reformed Church of America which is very similar to the Presbyterian Church. He appeared to have a great resume. He is in his early 50s, has served in positions in Texas and Nebraska and has lived in Iowa primarily since approximately 1998. He has been married to his high school sweetheart for 37 years, has one child and one grandchild who live in the Des Moines area. He has recently served two churches as Part Time Intentional Interim Minister including Ankeny Presbyterian in Ankeny, Iowa. He was hired by unanimous vote.

The Budget & Finance report indicated that there have been some areas that need some work to tighten up procedures. This is not so much an indication that there is a problem but to change some procedures to make sure problems do not occur. These changes are being made.

We celebrated the retirement of Rev. Goanar Chol and Rev. John Gilmore. Goanar fled the warfare and unrest in his native South Sudan many years ago. He has been a part of Des Moines Presbytery for about 20 years and has held various positions. He has done pulpit supply and preached at least once at our church. He is a very humble, caring, well loved man. It was obvious he will be missed around the Presbytery office. Rev. Gilmore has been active in the ministry for many years, serving many different churches. He has been serving as interim at Union Park for about 4 years and based on the accolades he received from his congregation, he also is very much loved.

The PCUSA is sponsoring a class titled, "Practical Presbytery Leadership Training" on August 26-27, 2016. Anyone involved in Presbytery leadership is invited to attend.

The Personnel Committee presented several people to fill empty spots, including Karen Quinn on the Sexual Misconduct Response Team. There are still several openings remaining.

Thank you, First Presbyterian Church family, for your concern since the death of our daughter, Michelle Kirchhoff Capman. The prayer shawls, funeral luncheon, and the care received from Meghan for our entire family are greatly appreciated.

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of March were \$11,568.50. This was \$1,048.50 above budget for the month. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$543 for the month, which is \$193 below budget.

Church Life committee received \$413 in donations for the potato bar. These funds support other fellowship events throughout the year. We collected \$80 in per capita donations, bringing our total to \$4,720, which is \$180 more than we had budgeted. In total for the month, expenses were \$788 over budget.

Year-to-date through April, pledges are \$6,192 over budget and expenses are \$2,497 over budget.

The Deacons made donations to the Salvation Army meal program and the Muñozes fertilizer program and paid for supplies. The Mission-Local fund made a \$100 donation to the Catholic Peace Ministry as an honorarium for mediation services provided for Presbytery El Salvador.

We received an additional \$13.24 for the One Great Hour special offering. The total offering of \$745.93 was remitted in May.
