

## **Message from Pastor Linda**

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5. Lent is a time for prayer, fasting, and self-examination as we prepare to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ on Easter. It is a period of 40 days, like the flood of Genesis, Moses' sojourn at Mount Sinai, Elijah's journey to Mount Horeb, Jonah's call to Ninevah to repent and Jesus' time of testing in the wilderness. (The Sundays in Lent are not counted in this reckoning of the time between Ash Wednesday and Easter, as every Lord's Day is a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.)

Lent gives us an opportunity to devote particular time and thought to what it means to say that in baptism, we are united with Jesus in his life, death, and resurrection. To appropriate the new life that is beyond the power of death means we must die with Christ who was raised for us. To live for Christ, we must die with him. New life requires a daily surrendering of the old life, letting go of the present order, so that we may embrace the new humanity. "I die every day!" asserts Paul (1 Corinthians 15:31). Resurrection necessitates death as a preceding act. The church's peculiar Lenten claim is that in dying we live, that all who are baptized into Christ are baptized into his death. To be raised with Christ means one must also die with Christ. In order to embrace the resurrection, we must experience the passion of Jesus. The way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death of the "old self". In dying, we live.

Pick up a Lenten calendar and a fish bank (both are available in the narthex) and use them as part of your Lenten discipline. The calendar was written with our younger members in mind, but activities can be adapted for any age; we're all children of our Father God in heaven! If a particular activity doesn't fit your circumstances, come up with an alternative that fits better. The point is that we can all benefit from giving of our finances, of our material possessions, and of ourselves during this time of fasting, of making sacrifices that lead us to think about the sacrifice Jesus gave on our behalf. Sharing in the activities as a congregation will allow us to support each other during this journey of reflection and deepening of faith while leading us to give of ourselves in concrete ways that will benefit others.

#### Arias in Newton returns for Second Year



The Third Annual *Arias in Newton* concert will be held on **Sunday, March 9 at 4:00pm.** The concert is part of the programming for the Newton Chapter of Des Moines Metro Opera's Guild Chapters. The concert will consist of arias and ensemble pieces performed by the OPERA lowa Educational Touring Troupe, a five-singer troupe of young professional artists, selected from more than one thousand national auditions, that acts as the educational arm of Des Moines Metro Opera. The troupe is currently in the middle of a ten-week tour around the state and parts of Missouri performing in schools and community concert

venues. *Arias in Newton* is part of their performance schedule and they will perform selections from opera and musical theater. Their program includes selections from Mozart, Donizetti and other luminaries of the operatic repertory. They will sing highlights from some of opera's most popular pieces like *The Magic Flute* and *Carmen* as well as highlights from the Broadway stage. General tickets are \$15, \$10 for Guild members and \$5 for students. Proceeds go to support the Newton Guild.

## **Presbytery Meeting Report**

The 494<sup>th</sup> stated meeting of The Des Moines Presbytery was held at Ankeny Presbyterian Church on Saturday. February 8.

Here are the highlights from that meeting:

The Compassion, Peace and Justice Task Force (CPJ) has a new moderator and a new meeting time. The new moderator is Rev. Michelle Parsons. The next meeting time will be Monday, March 10 at 4:30 pm. They are interested in additional members who have a desire to help promote social ministries in the Presbytery of Des Moines.

The Budget and Finance committee approved the donation of 40% ownership of the La Casa Pastoral property in Berlin, El Salvador to the Presbytery of Des Moines from the Rev. Robert Cook. All costs in the transfer of ownership will be covered by Companeros.

The Congregational Health Task Force is organized, working, and exploring ways to support the health of our 57 congregations. They informed us of a speaker who will be at the Global Pavilion in Pella, IA. Peter Steinke is being brought to Pella through the Vermeer Charitable Foundation on Mar. 31 and April 1. The theme is "When God does a new thing, what do you do with the old things?" Registration is \$25. Visit: <a href="https://www.vermeer.com">www.vermeer.com</a> for more information.

Leadership Council planned small group conversations which happened right after announcements after lunch. The group was divided into 4 groups alphabetically and a series of questions were asked on the topic "What Do We Want the Presbytery to Be"? Some of the discussion in our group centered on trying to use technology to hold meetings, instead of leaving out so many who can't attend due to distance, etc. Expect more to come on these small group breakout discussions with topics of: How Do We Do Budget?; General Assembly Report; and Where Two or Three Are Gathered.

We have instructed Jenny, our office manager, to order new candles for our pew candle holders used during the Christmas Eve service. Two boxes containing 12 candles each have been ordered, as there are 30 candle holders, but only 10 candles that can be reused.

The committee is asking that the building of a permanent, attractive, and useful ramp for the sanctuary be again considered by Session.

## **Budget and Finance Corner**

Pledges for the month of January were \$29,410. This was \$3,814 higher than budget. Other regular giving was \$1,015, which was \$279 higher than budgeted. The church's per capita payment was remitted to Presbytery. Total expenses were \$377 under budget.

The Foundation received \$10,000 from the Swanger memorial. The Muñoces fund received donations and paid expenses related to the February trip. The funds were disbursed for fertilizer, scholarships, feed bags, healthcare and school supplies. The Work Week fund received contributions of \$631 for the pork loin luncheon fundraiser.

The Bills and Overtures Task Group report included 2 overtures, one of which passed and one which didn't. The Marriage Equality Proposed Amendment, On Amending W-4.9000, Marriage passed 48 to 26. This is an overture to the 221<sup>st</sup> General Assembly, which will be held in Detroit in June. I feel that this is an important enough issue to include the wording here.

Amend W-4.9000 by striking the current text and replacing it with the following:

"Marriage is a gift God has given to all humankind for the well-being of the entire human family. Marriage involves a unique commitment between two people to love and support each other for the rest of their lives. The sacrificial love that unites the couple sustains them as faithful and responsible members of the church and the wider community.

In civil law, marriage is a contract that recognizes the rights and obligations of the married couple in society. In the Reformed tradition, marriage is also a covenant in which God has an active part, and which the community of faith publicly witnesses and acknowledges.

If they meet the requirements of the civil jurisdiction in which they intend to marry, a couple may request that a service of Christian marriage be conducted by a teaching elder in the Presbyterian Church (USA), who is authorized, though not required, to act as an agent of the civil jurisdiction in recording the marriage contract. A couple requesting a service of Christian marriage shall receive instruction from the teaching elder, who shall agree to the couple's request only if, in the judgment of the teaching elder, the couple demonstrates sufficient understanding of the nature of the marriage covenant and commitment to living their lives together according to its values. In making this decision, the teaching elder may seek the counsel of the session, which has authority to permit or deny the use of church property for a marriage service.

The marriage service shall be conducted in a manner appropriate to this covenant and to the forms of Reformed worship, under the direction of the teaching elder and the supervision of the session (W-1.4004-4006). In a service of marriage, the couple marry each other by exchanging mutual promises. The teaching elder witnesses the couple's promises and pronounces God's blessing upon their union. The community of faith pledges to support the couple in upholding their promises; prayers may be offered for the couple, for the communities which support them, and for all who seek to live in faithfulness.

A service of worship recognizing a civil marriage and confirming it in the community of faith may be appropriate when requested by the couple. The service will be similar to the marriage service except that the statements made shall reflect the fact that the couple are already married to one another according to the laws of the civil jurisdiction."

Presbyterian Women of the Presbytery announced that The Spring Connection is set for Sat. April 5 and will most likely be at St. Paul Presbyterian in Johnston.

The next Presbytery meeting is Tuesday, May 20 in Lucas and will be held in the Community Center.

## Work Week 2014

Work Week for 2014 will be in Winnebago, Nebraska, from July 5-12. Winnebago is a small community on the Indian reservation of the Ho-Chunk tribe and is located about 20 miles south of Sioux City, IA. We will be hosted by a church of the Reformed Church in America, which has had a presence there for over 100 years.

Here is part of an email message from Rev. Lowell TenClay, pastor of the church:

We believe God gives each of us gifts and resources specifically for other people. If we don't have opportunity to use those resources, we fail to accomplish what we have been called to do. In Winnebago, we provide opportunity. That is the gift God has given us to share. We have projects available from unskilled painting and yard clean-up to access ramps, home cleaning, repair and renovation, floor replacement, cabinet varnishing, drywall repair, applying siding, fence building, and more. We operate on a limited budget, so support for those projects that require materials comes from two areas. The mission teams provide some materials, and the tribe provides materials where we can justify it from their perspective. We have an excellent relationship with housing, emergency housing, and the tribal council, and have been able to work well with them in the past. Some people are not gifted in physical work, but work well with children. VBS-like craft programs and activities are appreciated though we never know how many children will appear. We have also done a number of basketball tournaments to try to reach out to teens and young adults. Soccer and softball are becoming more interesting to our people as well. We will do our best to match your gifts to an opportunity.

In a phone conversation he further stated that there are over 100 houses in the area that are currently uninhabitable, waiting for renovation so that existing families can use them. It sounds as if we will have work to do!

We hope to learn about the history of the Ho-Chunk tribe as a way to understand their present situation and their aspirations for the future.

A group from Brooklyn Presbyterian Church will be going with us. Anna Hilpiper, Dana Hashman's daughter, is heading this up. Their church wants to start the tradition of going on Work Week trips, so they will be learning the ins and outs of putting a trip together. The Brooklyn group will be holding a barbeque rib dinner as a fund raiser to help with expenses.

Our initial fund raiser was a pork loin lunch after church on January 12. We served 57 people and raised \$600. Thank you to those who helped us out. Our other two fundraisers will be the Spring Luncheon and Style show in conjunction with Mode Huis. This event will be on **Friday, April 4**. The annual ice cream social will be **Tuesday, June 3**. We hope you will support us in these fundraisers. Additional ones may be added, if needed.

## Report on 2014 Delegation to Muñoces, El Salvador

The delegation representing First Presbyterian Church left on a 5:30 AM flight on January 21, arriving at the San Salvador airport about 12:20 PM. Larry Anderson and Isaac Mathison-Bowie had made this trip before, but for Brian Anderson and Anders Hopkins it was a new experience. We were all very hungry after having nothing to eat for at least 8 hours, so we bought fast food chicken at the airport. We left the fresh veggies alone, as that's one of the first rules of eating in El Salvador. We were all enjoying the warmth of the Salvadoran sunshine, having left sub-zero weather behind.

The early arrival allowed us to make the 2 ½ hour trip to Berlin and settle in early to La Casa Pastoral. Katherine Pater, the Compañeros mission coworker in Berlin, had met us at the airport, and we met Blanca and Cecilia, members of the pastoral team, at La Casa.

The pastoral team insists, rightly, that delegations with first-timers spend time visiting sites that commemorate the horrors of the civil war that raged in the country from the late 1970s to 1992. It is beyond dispute, in our view, that the USA contributed to those horrors by providing funding and training for military operations that committed atrocities against innocent people. This is not a political stance, but rather a humanitarian one. It is sobering to visit El Mozote and hear the story of the systematic torture and murder of hundreds of men, women, and children. The list of names at the memorial begins with Concepcion Sanchez — a three day old baby girl. One woman miraculously escaped to tell the story of this massacre, but there were many, many others equally horrific during the war.

The next three days we traveled to Muñoces and back, bouncing in the back of the pickup as we made the 50 minute trip of about 6 miles. We were greeted warmly by the community and had our initial meeting with the Directiva, the eleven members of the community elected to oversee community projects in partnership with the pastoral team and with us. That was a joyful meeting, but also one in which we heard first-hand of the ongoing difficulties of making a living in subsistence farming. These friends of ours work extremely hard, but due to systemic inequities in the Salvadoran economy in which the deck is stacked against them, they cannot get ahead.

Despite this, as we proceeded to make our visits to each home in the community, we were greeted by smiling faces indicating warm acceptance. We inquired about each family's health, how the water tanks are working, how the children are doing in school, and so on. They expressed much appreciation to our church for providing the tanks, the high school scholarships, money for medical needs, and for the small gifts we bring each time we visit – this time, bags containing basic food necessities. And they asked about people from our church they've come to care about and who didn't make the trip this year.

We interrupted our visits each of the first two days to have some fun with the kids. We had invited them to bring something they could play like a percussion instrument, and they brought plastic containers, cans, sticks, and a whole array of "drums." We then had them imitate us in basic rhythms in a drum circle. Some of the kids caught on easily, while others seemed to have trouble with the whole concept. Nonetheless, there were recognizable rhythm patterns emerging, and everyone had a good time.

Each evening we sat down with Katherine, and sometimes with Blanca and Cecilia, and reflected on the day. One evening Katherine helped us understand the importance of liberation theology as the basis for the work in the communities – that it's through solidarity with the poor that we experience and build the Kingdom of God. These conversations were invaluable in integrating our experiences and increasing our understanding of why we were there.

On our third day in Muñoces we met again with the Directiva and had a signing ceremony for the covenant relationship among our church, their community, the pastoral team, and Compañeros, which was extended for another three years. We then departed for nearby El Tablon, where we had been invited to attend a wedding. This turned out to be one of the more uncomfortable experiences we had. Let's just say that we violated many of the taboos about wedding crashing in our culture, but had we declined the invitation, that would have been the ultimate violation in that culture – so we just did our best to enjoy the ride. We returned to Muñoces and had our annual fiesta. We brought four piñatas which the children gleefully broke open, creating a frenzy to pick up the candy. The pleasure this brings to the adults is visible in their expressions. We said our good-byes – including especially warm ones from some of the Directiva – and bounced our way back to Berlin.

On Sunday morning we met at La Casa with the four students from Muñoces who are using our scholarship money to help them attend high school in Berlin. We then attended mass at the church in Berlin. After Skypeing with you all as you prepared for the annual meeting in fellowship hall, we left for San Salvador.

There we visited the National Cathedral where Archbishop Romero is entombed. Our friend and driver Alfredo took us to see some other sights in the city. We stayed at a very nice guest house, went out to dinner, found an ice cream place for dessert, and relaxed. The next day we took in the other important memorial sites – the Parque Cusclatan civil war memorial wall; the Divina Providencia cancer hospital where Oscar Romero lived and worked, and where he was assassinated in 1980; and the University of Central America, where in 1989 six outspoken Jesuit priests were murdered in grisly fashion along with their housekeeper and her teenage daughter. These places inspired moments of silent individual reflection.

Our last event was to see the magnificent views at Puerto del Diablo – Door of the Devil — outside San Salvador. All of mountainous El Salvador contains breathtaking views, but this was especially gorgeous. It offered some hiking opportunities as well.

We embarked on our trip home early the next morning and arrived in Houston amid sub-freezing temperature and freezing rain. So we were delayed in getting home by a few hours, but all arrived safe and sound – and ready to go back again as soon as we can.

We all thank the congregation again for letting us represent you in this relationship.

## **Outreach to El Salvador**

The successful delegation to Muñoces in January doesn't end the outreach from First Presbyterian to El Salvador. Kimberly Schnell left in February for a month of teaching English to children in Berlin, El Salvador. She has taught for several years at a school known as Brisas del Sol, named for the original community near Berlin that was destroyed a few years ago during an earthquake. The community was relocated to Berlin and, with support from the Pastoral Team and churches in the Des Moines Presbytery, the school was rebuilt and renamed "Friends of Iowa" school.

In March, Tom Mott will continue his 12-year participation with a medical delegation that will be based in Berlin and offer clinics in some of the villages nearby. This delegation was begun by First Presbyterian in the 1990's and is now a project of the Catholic Church. Tom has sought some training as an optician so that he can fit glasses for people in need of visual assistance during the clinics.

Kimberly and Tom were commissioned for their work during the February 16 worship service. They will be back in time to join the January Muñoces delegation of Larry and Brian Anderson, Anders Hopkins, and Isaac Mathison-Bowie for a presentation about their adventures on March 30. The El Salvador interest group is planning a light lunch following worship and our El Salvador adventurers will show pictures and tell stories following the lunch. Please mark your calendars and plan to stay awhile on **March 30!**

## Kids Against Hunger Event John Taylor, Board Member

On Saturday, February 15, seventeen people, youth and adults, representing our church met at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church to participate in the first packaging event of 2014 for Kids Against Hunger. As a team, we put soy products, vitamins, dehydrated vegetables, and white rice in a special 3-ply plastic bag which helps prevent spoilage and protect against insect or rodent problems. Properly packaged bags have a shelf life of up to 3 years.

After the ingredients were put in the bags, each bag was weighed to ensure they have the correct amount. Rice can be added or removed to reach the desired amount.

The bags are then sealed and boxed with 216 per box. Each team did 8 cases, which is 1,728 meals. The meals go to many countries, as well as places in the United States.

Thank you to the people who couldn't attend but supported us monetarily. It costs \$30 per person on a team, and we had enough money that the 6 youth didn't have to pay.
