# Meghan's Musings

So... What's the deal with the yoga?

Last September when I began teaching yoga classes here at the church I wrote about it here in the newsletter. However, I have recently discovered that some questions remain about the yoga classes so I'd like to take the opportunity to address those of which I am aware.

The main question seems to be about money. When I began teaching the classes, I requested and Session approved a suggested sliding scale donation for those taking the classes. The reasoning? First of all, for better or worse, people seem to value and take more seriously ventures when there is a monetary commitment involved. Secondly, the donations help offset costs associated with the yoga ministry: because of the donations we have been able to purchase yoga blankets and other props for the classes; donations also will enable me to get further training—I will be taking a kids yoga training this summer and hope to expand the yoga not only to the kids in our church but hopefully it can be an outreach to kids who are not already active in our church community. Additionally, these donations can help pay for the cost of heating the room for yoga, should the Budget and Finance Committee determine that necessary. My dream would be to one day use the donations to help fund the transformation of one of our unused Sunday school rooms into a yoga studio, but that would be way off in the future.

When we discussed this in Session, the question arose whether I would be getting a "cut" of the donations. Some Session members felt that would be fair and were in support of the idea. However, I feel strongly that the yoga ministry is part of my call as a pastor in general and part of my call to First Presbyterian Church specifically. If I were leading a monthly Taize style worship service and a free-will offering were taken, there would be no question as to whether or not I would receive a portion of those donations. Likewise, I feel it would be equally inappropriate for me to receive income from the donations received for the yoga classes.

As a ministry of this congregation, that raises other questions about what exactly we mean by "donation"? Is it *really* a donation or is it really *expected* that participants pay? My answer is this: first, it is *really* a donation. It is a free-will basket. No one is watching to make sure you throw some money in or how much money you donate. Second, no one is turned away for lack of payment. If you cannot donate or choose not to, you are still welcome no questions asked. Third, if you are already contributing financially to the ministry of First Presbyterian and you feel like you do your share, then by all means, do not feel obligated to donate to this particular aspect of our ministry. However, there might be some who are already tithing 10% (or more) to the church who choose to donate additionally when taking yoga classes as a way of supporting this particular ministry. Which is also more than welcome. Whether or not, how much and how often participants donate is all up to their own discernment and is entirely between them and God.

And finally, I would like to stress the value of the yoga ministry not only as a discipline for physical, spiritual and emotional health but also as an outreach of this congregation. I would estimate at least half, perhaps even more, of the participants in the classes are not even members of this First Presbyterian. So yoga really is a valuable outreach, spiritual practice, health practice and service to the community that First Presbyterian Church is offering.

Norm is currently Director of Choral Activities at Newton Senior High School where he has conducted the Frosh Choir, Newton Singers, Varsity Chorale, Jazz Choir and Chamber Choir since 2008. He is a graduate of Williamsburg High School and Central College, Pella, with graduate hours in music education at the University of Northern Iowa and the University of South Dakota, Vermillion. Norm has also taught at Ackley-Geneva, Williamsburg, Sioux Center and Northwestern College. During his teaching career his choristers distinguished themselves with over two-hundred members in OPUS, All-State, Regional and National honor choirs, thirty-five consecutive years of Large Group and Chamber Choir superior ratings and over forty Outstanding Performance Awards. Choirs under his direction twice sang at the Dorian Choral Festival, were named Outstanding Choir at the 2004 New York City Choral Festival on Staten Island, and in 2000, sang at Carnegie Hall. Grimm is a frequent adjudicator and clinician and with wife, Marlys, as collaborative pianist, has been guest conductor for many Junior High and High School conference, regional and honor choirs throughout Nebraska and lowa, including the 1993 OPUS Boys Honor Choir. He is Past President of the 900 member Iowa Choral Director's Association. For twenty years Norm sang with the gospel trio "His Light", with whom he recorded seven albums and sang nearly 400 concerts in churches and convention centers throughout the upper Midwest. He and Marlys have four talented children, four wonderful children-in-law, and ten adorable grandchildren.

#### Fertilizer arrives in Muñoces!

Once again the generous donors of First Presbyterian Church have purchased fertilizer for the farmers of Muñoces. The planting season is beginning so the fertilizer was delivered to the community a few weeks ago. After hoping to help the farmers of Muñoces convert to natural fertilizers we have found that the process of using natural fertilizers does not work well in rural El Salvador. People who rely on their crops to feed their families cannot afford the years required to amend the soil when the land must not be used. And most of the farmers of Muñoces rent land rather than own it and land owners are not about to let the land be unused (and unrented!) while the soil is being amended. So chemical fertilizer remains the best way to produce a good crop from the rocky, depleted soil.

Each farmer who is able gives a small bag of corn to "pay" for the fertilizer which is, in turn, sold by the Pastoral team to help support communities in the area who do not have a partnership with a church in lowa. We help the farmers of Muñoces and the farmers in Muñoces help the people of neighboring communities. A gift that keeps on giving!
