The Love of God is like a St. Bernard Puppy

I recently had the pleasure of seeing one of those heart-warming videos that helps restore faith and hope that there is still good in the world. Here's the text that went along with the video:

A lonely widow found joy in life again... when an unexpected visitor started to stop by. Ever since Sally's husband died almost 30 years ago she's been finding life very lonely... especially since her kids are spread out all over the country. But when her neighbors adopted a very special puppy... everything changed. The pup seemed to sense that his new neighbor might need him. The adorable St. Bernard pup named Brody, soon found his way into Sally's yard and the pair bonded immediately. Brody started visiting Sally everyday... where he was always welcomed with open arms. Whenever Brody would disappear his family knew just where to look. It was like Brody knew Sally was missing someone and offered his support. Brody grew fast... the pair's friendship only grew stronger. Brody grew huge. Since the beginning, Sally spoiled Brody, and Brody kept Sally active. But most of all, they enjoyed each other's company. They were basically inseparable. Every time Sally was going somewhere, Brody wanted to come... and sometimes he even succeeded! Brody's big sister Lulu (a much smaller dog) was also invited to join the crew. And with these friendly neighbors by Sally's side, she wasn't alone anymore. Sometimes the small things in life can make all the difference. And a friendship with a huge pooch can make all the difference!

It's a lovely story and I'll post it on our Facebook page so you can have the opportunity to see Sally and Brody interact and this sweet pup grow from "little" puppy to "a beast" (as Sally jokingly calls him).

But it seems to me to be more than just a sweet story about a cute puppy befriending a lonely widow. And even more than an example of a wonderful family sharing their friendly puppy with someone in need of companionship.

This story reminded me of the parables of Jesus. Jesus was always using everyday examples to make points about God and about the Kingdom of God. And here we have a perfect parable about God's love. God's love is like a big, floppy, friendly St. Bernard puppy who seeks out a lonely widow and visits her every day, until they are inseparable and the widow isn't lonely anymore.

If you are in a position to share God's love with someone in need—as Brody and his family shared love with Sally, I encourage you to do so. And if you are in need of the assurance of God's love, I pray that you might remember that the Love of God is like a St. Bernard puppy. Amen.



Budget and Finance

Operating Revenue and Expenses for the 1st quarter 2019 January through March
 Pledges for the quarter were \$52,759. This was \$726 above budget for the quarter. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who give, but do not pledge, was \$3,080 for the quarter, which was \$1,873 above budget. We recorded a \$8,447 unrealized investment gain for the quarter, which more than offset the 4th quarter 2018 unrealized investment loss of \$4,532. Overall, our income was \$9,711 above budget due to the strong investment performance and Other Regular Giving.
Other Income for the quarter:
 We received \$52,289 in donations to cover per capita. This was \$711 below budget. The Memorial/Improvement Fund received \$700 from memorials honoring Carol Hammer, Ed McCuen and Pat Koppin.
 The Yoga fund received donations of \$505.
 The Deacon Fund received donations of \$85.46. The Designated Mission fund received a contribution toward the One Great Hour offering
(\$15) and Cents-Ability donations (\$115.01).
 The International Mission account received \$769 in donations for Days for Girls. The Sundays at 4 fund collected \$167.19 at the Grinnell Singers concert in March.

Expenses for the quarter:
 Expenses paid from the Memorial/Improvement Fund were a new furnace (\$3,486) and travel assistance for Lawrence Kenyi (\$750)
A donation of \$200 was made to the Salvation Army from the Deacon Fund.
 The Designated Mission fund remitted the 2018 Rural Harvest offering (\$530) and the Christmas Joy offering (\$450) and also donated \$750 for travel assistance to Lawrence
Kenyi.
 The International Mission account paid expenses of \$468.58 for Days for Girls. FINIANCIAL

Mission Committee

Larry Anderson, Chair

Mission accounts were reviewed with discussion about discrepancies in the Cents-ability account. The discrepancies were resolved and, because the account had more than \$200, the committee will disperse \$100 to the Salvation Army food pantry, \$50 to the Presbytery Hunger program, and \$50 to PCUSA Hunger programs as previously determined. One Great Hour of Sharing – was collected on April 14. The total amount raised was \$1200. *Cross Walk* – This was held on Good Friday, starting at St. Stephen's Episcopal church and ending at First Presbyterian. The attendance was down this year, but it was still a moving event as the group made stops at the seven downtown churches. At each stop, readings and prayers were said and a verse of "Were You There?" sung before moving on, following a volunteer carrying the cross. Sheltering discussion – The discussion continued of when or how First Presbyterian could be of help in times of needed shelter. Larry Anderson had contacted the Red Cross and it is believed that our church would not be eligible to be considered for a Red Cross shelter partly due to a lack of shower facilities. Larry will continue to talk to the Red Cross representative to determine when and how they respond in Jasper County to short term needs for shelter such as during the polar vortex this winter. **<u>Progress Industries 2nd Grade Tours</u>** – Two sessions were done in April and the last one will be on May 6. We are volunteering with members of UCC church as 2nd graders go through various stations to experience what it is like to do various tasks with disabilities. Spring Break meals follow-up – The Key Club has expressed an interest in continuing the project next year and the mission committee expressed a willingness to offer support again next year. Ice Cream Social – The ice cream social is scheduled for June 11 this year. Linda Anderson will begin contacting last year's chairpersons to see if they are to participate this year. <u>Meals on Wheels in June</u> – As a ministry of the Mission Coalition, members of First Presbyterian deliver Meals on Wheels to homes in Newton on Saturdays and Sundays in June. The meals are prepared at MercyOne Newton and information about where to deliver them is provided ahead of time. If you are available to spend less than an hour on a June Saturday or Sunday serving members of our community in this way, please sign up on the schedule posted in Fellowship Hall or contact Linda Curtis-Stolper (641-840-2417). Cooking classes – The proposal was made to offer instruction to those receiving food boxes from the Salvation Army on how to use and preserve the produce that may be abundant this summer but that some recipients may not know how to prepare. The Andersons will contact the Salvation Army to see if they would like to partner with us on this project. *Ramp Building* – Linda Anderson reported that 3 ramps are scheduled to be built this year. George Wilkening is dealing with blueprints and building permits and a date to begin construction will be set soon. A decision as to whether additional funds are needed will be held next month. <u>Presbyterian Women – The spring gathering will be May 18 in Johnston. The Synod</u> gathering is June 20 – 23 at the Gateway Center in Ames. *Mariners in Mission* – The Taylors participated in a recent work week at Camp Fellowship in South Carolina where many projects were completed by the 23 participants. There will be work weeks in Michigan in June and Missouri in September. Jasper County Take Away Hunger – The next Newton event will be June 29 at St. Luke's

Church. Days for Girls – The next event is May 23, with both morning and evening work sessions.
