Gratitude Practice (Not Gratitude Perfect)

It's that time of year. The time of year when those of us on Facebook are likely to see daily posts of things for which our friends are grateful. Some of us might even participate ourselves. It's that time of year when your pastor inevitably writes a newsletter article about gratitude and struggles to find a new angle. Something that will really click. Something that will be spiritually transformative for at least one person. Maybe even a handful of people.

In September, I had the opportunity to hear author Diana Butler Bass speak on the topic of gratitude. Not coincidently, she has a new book out on the subject (*Gratitude: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks*). Butler Bass confesses that she has long considered herself a "gratitude klutz" or maybe even worse. Despite her desire to be grateful, despite many short-lived efforts at gratitude practices, she just couldn't manage to keep the momentum going.

In past years, I've encouraged keeping a gratitude journal. This is a practice I endeavor to keep (sometimes more successfully than others) and I admit, occasionally I struggle to name something on a particular day. I try to name something new that I haven't written about before. I try to name something meaningful rather than trivial. Though it's my journal and I don't intend for anyone to be reading it, I try to name something that's not braggy or even humble braggy (one of my pet peeves are the "gratitudes" or "blessings" that people name publicly that really strike a tone of bragging about how great they are). With all these self-imposed rules for my gratitude journal, no wonder it's a struggle! I'm reminded of the common saying in yoga circles: it's called "yoga practice" not "yoga perfect."

So this November, I have a new idea for our gratitude practice (not gratitude perfect). In worship on November 4, I'll be handing out a gratitude prompt/project to help each of us turn our focus to gratitude throughout the month of November. If you can't be in worship that day but wish to participate, let me know and I'll be sure to get one to you.

We are receiving the award at this time in recognition of becoming a Hunger Action Congregation and our emphasis on continuing to learn and act to address hunger issues in our community and world. Offering letters expressing our concern to legislators as part of the Bread for the World campaign; collecting Cents-Ability "noisy offerings" to support programs serving the hungry; supporting Jasper County Kids Against Hunger, the Salvation Army Food Pantry, and the Backpack Buddies program; donating to the CROP Walk and One Great Hour of Sharing – we take part in rich ministries in support of efforts to end hunger.

You Might Be The Person

Each of us have been given special gifts by God. Perhaps you are a person who feels called to help out at the church, but you don't because you don't like attending meetings or getting up in front of the congregation on Sunday morning. Budget and Finance Corner

Operating Revenue and Expenses for the 3rd quarter 2018 ... July thru Sept.

- ♦ Pledges for the quarter were \$29,897. This was \$32 above budget for the quarter.
- Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$2,245 for the quarter, which was \$1,036 below budget.

Other Income for the month:

- ♦ A \$1,000 donation was received to go toward organ/piano repairs.
- ♦ Received \$175 donation for per capita.
- **♦ The Memorial Fund received \$920 in donations honoring Dick Means and Jack Nicholson.**
- ♦ Received a prepaid pledge in the amount of \$6,820.
- ♦ The Funeral Luncheon Fund received \$700 in donations from both the Means and Nicholson families.
- **♦ The Designated Mission fund received \$138.87 in Cents-Ability donations.**
- ♦ The International Mission account received \$130 for the Crop Walk and \$24 for Days for Girls.

Expenses for the month:

- Building/Grounds expense is above budget \$2,058 for the quarter due to higher than expected utilities and lawn mowing expense. Also, the organ tuning expense was incurred during the 3rd quarter.
- Personnel expenses were above budget \$647, due to paying for music substitutes and quarterly payroll taxes.
- **♦ The Funeral Luncheon Fund paid expenses related to the Means and Nicholson funerals.**
- ♦ The Yoga fund paid \$207.98 to reimburse Meghan for yoga expenses she had previously paid.
- The Designated Mission fund made contributions to the Salvation Army of \$100 and Presbytery of Des Moines for \$100 and paid a \$276 music scholarship.
- ♦ The International Mission account made a \$360 contribution for a food packaging event, gave \$200 to Presbytery USA in support of South Sudan and paid \$240.52 for Days for Girls expenses.
- The Undesignated Mission fund paid \$80.19 for expenses from the Ice Cream Social and made a \$200 donation for Hurricane Relief and a \$200 donation to Dakota Presbytery for the star quilt display.

In total for the quarter, expenses were \$2,205 over budget.

Year-to-date through September:

- Year-to-date pledges are \$29,125 over budget
- Other Regular Giving is \$3,094 over budget.
- **♦ Expenses are \$5,360 over budget**

The purpose of the Mission Committee is to recommend, approve, manage, and terminate mission projects. The committee communicates about opportunities for mission involvement and promotes congregational participation.

Harvest Offering

Members will be given the opportunity to give to this special offering of the Des Moines Presbytery on **November 11**. Our church has a particular history with this offering. Elder Murray Nelson attended a conference on world hunger in 1978 and decided to take some action. He persuaded Des Moines Presbytery to sponsor a Harvest Sunday Offering in the fall and use the money raised to give an agricultural education to a student from a third world country. After getting their training, the students had to agree to return to their native land and teach the people how to raise more and better crops. Murray headed the offering for five years and the original idea was practiced for a decade or more. Des Moines Presbytery still has this offering under a new name, Harvest Offering and the scope covers more than growing crops in third world countries. In 2018, one half of the Harvest Offering will serve rural lowans and one half of the offering is designated for programs and projects directed toward women in agriculture across the world.
