

Meghan's Musings

Random thoughts from your pastor...

<u>To hug or not to hug</u>: I'd like to take this opportunity to go on the record regarding hugs. Some people like to hug, some people don't. Some people prefer a handshake, others prefer no physical touch. Some people like to hold hands at certain times in worship while others want to crawl under the pew and hide if asked to do so.

Personally, I do like to hug. Especially since hearing about the health benefits of hugging (in case you hadn't noticed, I'm pretty into healthy behaviors). At the same time, I am very sensitive to the fact that some people do not particularly like to hug and some downright loathe it. That's ok. It doesn't make you a bad person, or even an unfriendly person. Surely you have your reasons and who am I to question that?

Therefore, my general policy as a pastor is not to initiate a hug. If someone else initiates a hug, I take it but I rarely will start it and when I do, unless I am confident a hug will be ok, I usually ask permission. Granted, I usually ask permission while I'm on my way in for a hug so it doesn't really give the recipient an opportunity to resist—that's something I need to work on. All this to say: if you want to hug me, I'm open. But I'll probably have already offered you a handshake (especially coming out of the sanctuary on Sunday morning) so feel free to refuse the hand and go for the hug. And if you're neither a hugger nor a hand-shaker (or if on a particular day you feel ill and don't want to spread germs—for which I thank you) feel free to simply hold your hands in whatever way you like and give me a head nod. I won't be offended!

CROP Walk Sunday, October 5


The walk will take place at 2 pm, with registration at 1:30 pm at the Courthouse.

Mariners In Mission Report:

Barb and John Taylor recently returned from another MIM mission. They and 17 other workers joined at Covenant Point Retreat Center near Holt's Summit, MO. It is a somewhat rustic campground that mainly serves the youth of the area, although there are other sessions for adults. Because the cabins do not have running water, the campground has only warm season uses. We cleaned out one old cabin and intended to knock it down. But instead, we knocked it off its foundation and broke the tractor. The terrain is hilly causing the gravel roads to wash out. We unloaded and spread rock over much of the road through camp. The pavilion has lights with ceiling fans and only 2 outlets. It needed to have the fans rewired to run independently of the lights and outlets placed in the stage for today's electrical entertainment. We had a father and daughter that accomplished that task. The basement of the dining hall is also the storm shelter and storage for many unorganized parts. We cleaned out the storage and reorganized it, throwing away the unusable parts and selling the copper parts. The sliding doors allow light into the room, but are a hazard for storms. The sewing team used 6 banners that had been made by campers, lined them and made them fit the doors to darken and protect the room from flying glass. The bulk of our work was routing, sanding and painting 62 signs to mark trails, buildings and direct visitors to the areas of use. We also celebrated the director's 9 year old daughter's birthday and John's birthday also. The September MIM is the annual meeting for the group. John and Barb were reelected as the presidents of the group and as such will be attending PCCCA conference in Kansas Citain November.

Charge to the Congregation

At the end of Meghan's Installation service on Sunday, September 14, Gary Parson presented the "Charge to the Congregation". Since it involves all of us, we felt it should be available for all to read. Thank you Gary, for adding the personal touches to the charge and presenting it at the Installation service.

"As we begin our journey with Rev. Davis there are several things we as a congregation need to think about. It is our first thought to consider what WE expect of a pastor. For example, we expect them to be a spiritual leader, teacher, business leader (physical & financial side of the church), friend, crisis manager, baby sitter, role model, community leader and this list is not all inclusive.

On the other hand, what does your pastor have a right to expect of us as individuals and as a congregation? Some thoughts:

The pastor has a right to:

Your friendship - founded on mutual respect and a willingness to ignore minor faults for the sake of major virtues.

A right to expect time - Time to learn more about you and the congregation's needs, time to develop and begin a program to meet those needs.

A right to her own opinions - Each of us has a different background, attitudes and interests. We would not want a leader who did not have strong personal convictions. Likewise, it is impossible for us to all agree on everything. We need to realize that a church can function very well even though we don't all agree. A right to your loyalty-Constructive criticism, offered in love, is healthy. Grumbling and gossiping is destructive. Speak to her directly. You will find her warm and approachable - more so after her morning coffee.

A right to her privacy - While she will always be available for urgent needs, she must have time to be alone with God and herself if she is to be strong in the spirit. Remember, a solo pastor is never totally off the clock. A right to expect that you will help her grow just as you hope to prosper under her pastoral care.

A right to expect tolerance which will permit her to try things without the advance condemnation, "We've never done it that way before."

A right to expect your prayers and help. Look to her for leadership in building and strengthening the church. But she cannot do it alone. It is a team ministry with each of us linking arms to work together. Yes, she has the right to expect us to continue being an active, involved church as we were before - we came through a very challenging time as an intact, involved, caring congregation because we stuck together and worked together. It is not time for us to rest on our laurels and let her do all the work. We need to continue our dedicated service and help her in every way possible.

A right to expect that you will be kind - She is a human being and will undoubtedly have her share of human weaknesses. Why do we expect a pastor to be above human reactions, while we feel free to vent our emotions? Be thoughtful, understanding and forgiving in your attitudes.

A right to expect that, in our relationships, in our congregation, our families, our work and recreation, we will seek to glorify our Lord by our attitudes, thoughts and actions.

The PNC was not always in agreement about everything but we were always able to come to a final agreement about everything. We were and are unanimous in our support of Rev. Davis and pray that you will be, too.

We authored our mission statement which we are very proud of. We feel it characterizes our churches past, present and hopes for the future. It states: THE MISSION OF FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NEWTON, IOWA IS TO SHARE THE LOVE OF GOD AND GROW THE BODY OF CHRIST THROUGH JOYFUL WORSHIP AND FELLOWSHIP, DEVOTED PRAYER AND STUDY, AND HUMBLE SERVICE IN OUR COMMNITY AND WORLD." We know Rev. Davis is the one to guide us to fulfill that mission statement."

Presbyterian Women

Eight ladies from Des Moines Presbytery ventured to Pierre, SD for tent meetings of the Dakota Presbytery and Congregational church in the reservations. Barb Taylor accompanied the group and found the services to be very meaningful and the attendants to be very welcoming. The ladies had good conversations about many things native and personal. The native ministers led the many sessions with dedication and devotion. We brought some auction items but they weren't prepared for that so we just sold them for whatever someone wanted to give. The money was turned over to the Dakota Presbyterian Women for their projects. Toni Buffalo led the youth in a worship service and introduced the Wateca Challenge. This is a challenge to all to help preserve the earth and take care of the land. Each youth prepared a quote that helped them understand the needs of the earth. In promoting this challenge, she lamented that over time, the people have learned to rely on others for the things they can do for themselves and have forgotten that "food is sacred". There were many comments about the way "it used to be" when the tent was full and the food was plentiful. (It seems that the Indians have gone the way of the "white man" opinion). Ernie Big Hom reported on his project of translating the Dakota hymnbook to English. He states that the younger generation can sing the songs but do not know what they are singing about.

Many of the parents who attended boarding school were not allowed to speak their native tongue to each other without being severely punished. They have forgotten much of their language for this reason but also they wanted their children to learn the English that they had been taught to use. Pam Yellow Bird, who reports being a mix of several tribes, reports that our task is "not to walk in front of us to lead us, not to walk behind us to push us, but to take our hand and walk beside us to support us."

The Des Moines Presbytery PW helped make this cultural exchange possible with supportive funds. Come hear more about the experience at the Fall Gathering.
