## **Meghan's Musings**

"Love is patient..."

I Corinthians 13:4-7: Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

We all know the verses. We've heard them at weddings. Maybe it was even used in your own wedding. But when Paul was writing to the church in Corinth, he wasn't dispensing marriage advice. He was trying to help the different church members and factions to get along better: to *be* the Body of Christ. I've been thinking about patience a lot this summer. How easily I lose my patience with others. How easily church members seem to lose patience with one another (or\*gasp\* maybe even me). And I write this article for my own sake as much as for the sake of anyone else.

I notice that a couple of things tend to challenge my ability to be patient. One is simply my own health and well-being. When I'm not eating well, getting sufficient exercise and especially if I'm not getting adequate sleep, it's more difficult for me to remain patient. Perhaps the same is true for you. So this is yet another reason to add to the pile of reasons why self-care is so important. The other major factor is how close I am to someone. It's odd but true that for me, and perhaps for you, the better I know someone, the harder it is for me to be patient with them and the harder it is for me to be on my kindest, best behavior with them. (As my poor mother can attest, as close as we are, I lose my patience with her shamefully easily.) So, as work week wore on and I got more tired and also closer with the other members of the team, I'm sorry to say that my patience grew pretty thin at times.

When I was a kid I had a record (remember LPs?) that had a Christian themed story and songs on it. I do not remember the name of the record or the story or any of the songs except one that I still sing to myself and my unfortunate family with some regularity: "Have patience, have patience, don't be in such a hurry. When you get impatient, you only start to worry. Remember, remember, that God has patience, too. And think of all the times that others had to wait for you."

Of course, patience has many more facets than simply waiting for people who are slow. I know that there have been some mix-ups lately with volunteer schedules, items not being communicated properly, and the like. I know this can be frustrating. But I would like to ask you to have patience with me, with the office staff during this time of transition and with other church volunteers remembering, "Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." And also, "Remember, remember, that God has patience, too. And think of all the times that others had to [be patient with] you."

## **Presbytery Meeting**

Meghan and I attended the Presbytery Meeting in Knoxville on Saturday, August 20. Items of interest from this meeting were:

- 1. Our worship service was based on "Hope" and mirrored a service held at General Assembly. James Koopman, our Interim General Presbyter, gave the message.
- 2. Received a report from those who attended the General Assembly meeting in Portland, Oregon. Each told of the committee they were on and the highlights they experienced while there.
- 3. Heard from the Sudanese Support Team. A couple representatives from the Sudanese Arabic Congregation spoke about the civil war going on in their country and gave a heartbreaking account about the whereabouts of their families. Many don't know where their families are and if any are even alive. A prayer was offered for all peoples of the South Sudan going through this war.
- 4. Approved having the Interim General Presbyter position be full-time position and his salary retroactive back to when he began on May 18, 2016. Also approved having his membership moved from the Reformed Church in America to PC(USA).
- 5. Approved extending the term of service for our Stated Clerk from 1-year to 2-years, at the same compensation rate.
- 6. Heard the report of CROSS Ministries and their 24th annual back-to-school giveaway. This year a record number of 1,641 children were provided with a new backpack filled with basic supplies. Some people waited in line for nearly five hours to receive their supplies.
- 7. Voted to approve the dissolution of the First Presbyterian Church in New Sharon.

## **Budget and Finance Corner**

Pledges for the month of July were \$9,610. This was \$910 below budget for the month. It is not unusual to have lower pledges during the summer months. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$439 for the month, which is \$297 below budget. In total for the month, expenses were \$1,115 under budget.

Year-to-date through July, pledges are \$3,709 over budget and expenses are \$1,500 over budget.
