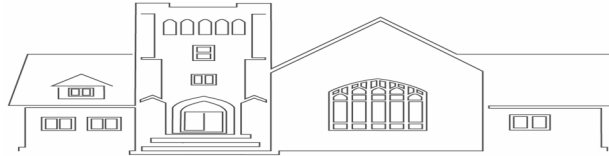

Meghan's Musings

The Case for Advent Hymns
Or
Why can't we sing Christmas Carols before Christmas?
Or
Why do you want to make your pastor cry?

Back in October, I was asked in a worship and music committee meeting whether we would be singing Advent or Christmas hymns leading up to Christmas. Without hesitation I declared that we will be singing Advent hymns. The unenthusiastic response of the committee to my off-the-cuff attempt to explain the importance of celebrating Advent in Advent and waiting until Christmas for Christmas made me think perhaps I should make a more articulate statement to the entire church family in my musings.

Now, down to the wire needing to write this article I'm feeling less inspired. The truth is, I really love many of the Advent hymns. They represent the longing and anticipation of the season and the longing of our souls (or at least my soul) that merits a season to itself, not to be short-changed by our desire for instant gratification. If we don't sing them now, when will we sing them? The truth is, we've been hearing the Christmas music in the stores and in TV ads and on radio stations since early November. Are we really longing to sing them in worship, too? (Obviously, for me the answer is "no" and yet for many the answer is "yes".) The truth is, it troubles the Spirit within me that capitalism has hijacked Christmas, turned it into a commercial event (and if you *really* want to make me cry, tell me about your Black Friday shopping adventures) and stripped away so much of the depth and significance of the Holy Day of December 25 and completely jettisoned the holy seasons of Advent and Christmas (the season that *begins* on the night of Christmas Eve and lasts for twelve days, not 24 hours) that one of the most significant ways I can think of to fight back, be counter-cultural and "keep the Christ in Christmas" is to hold on to the Advent hymns. (You can have my Advent hymns when you pry them out of my cold, dead hands. Or something...).

I posed the question of Facebook, asking my pastor-type friends to give me their best argument for Advent hymns. Here are a couple of the responses I received:

"Long and short of it is that we aren't there yet. A season of preparation, like we do for our homes, is needed. A season to remind us who we are awaiting isn't a bad thing. A season to count the days with eager anticipation. A season (4 whole weeks) to remember why it is such a big deal that a child was born in Bethlehem." ~Wade Halva

"I don't like singing about Jesus being born until he is. That, and if you look at infant mortality rates until rather recently, no new baby coming could be taken as a given." ~Katherine Craven

"Advent--and take notice that here I am going to explain to you the liturgical sense of this beautiful word--these weeks of preparation for Christmas are called Advent because the proper spirit is a waiting for the one that will come. Advent is 'coming.'" ~Monseñor Romero, December 3rd, 1978 (submitted by our mission co-worker Katherine Pater who added, "If someone wants to disagree with Romero, I can't help you.")

And so, my prayer for each and every one of you is that you may have a Blessed and Meaningful Advent. And a Merry Christmas! (But not until the night of December 24!)

Church Life Activities

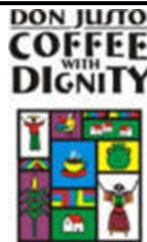

Fairly Traded

Our Sister Parish attempts to follow standards designed to reduce or eliminate inequalities found in the conventional coffee trade. For each pound of Don Justo Coffee with Dignity purchased, funds are divided into three categories:

- **The local economy in and around Berlin, El Salvador** (growing, harvesting, processing, roasting and grinding the coffee)
- **Administrative and supply costs** (bags, labels, flavor oils, and shipping to the United States)
- **The Pastoral Team** who assist with local social and economic development projects in and around Berlin, El Salvador

The El Salvador Interest Group will once again feature items for sale during the upcoming Advent Bazaar. Items will be available on Sunday mornings before and after church during Advent. A member of the interest group will be available if you have questions about the items. Items offered are Don Justo coffee in sample packets (makes 10 cups). These are displayed in First Presbyterian cups marking our 150th Anniversary. There are jewelry items, some scarves, Gifts in a Jar, etc., and there will be some Christmas ornaments for sale. Stop by and see how you can support our El Salvador mission by buying coffee and crafts from El Salvador and get a head start on your Christmas shopping.

Emergency Closure of the Church

With the arrival of winter weather, we have reviewed and updated our policies at First Presbyterian. In the event of severe weather, any changes to scheduled activities at the church will be communicated to KCOB Radio. They have assured us such information will be sent out over all 3 of their stations (1280 AM, 95.9 FM and KRTI 106.7 FM which covers Grinnell, Marshalltown, parts of Des Moines, etc.) In addition we have established an account with KCCI Television and WHO Radio. When severe weather occurs, check these sources. If First Presbyterian is not mentioned on any of these, then there is no change in our plans. However, if you have any doubts, please err on the side of caution and be safe!

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of October were \$11,699. This was \$205 below budget for the month. Other Regular Giving for the month was \$750, which was \$14 above budget.

Year-to-date pledges are \$2,863 lower than budgeted and year-to-date expenses are \$2,213 below budget.

The Foundation received \$1,000 from an estate plus another \$10 donation. The Kitchen renovation fund received \$503 from a memorial. We collected \$393 for the Rural Harvest offering and this was remitted to Presbytery in November. The Deacons contributed \$300 to Work Week and \$400 to the Salvation Army Wednesday night meal program and Compassion Fund. The Work Week fund also received \$500 from their work day donations.

The Budget & Finance committee sincerely appreciates the many generous stewardship pledges received from our church family.

We will have the opportunity to provide Christmas gifts to selected Progress Industry clients. Coming soon -- a paper tree will be displayed on the bulletin board across from the sanctuary with a client’s name and a few gift suggestions. Look for it!

A Christmas party for prisoners at the Newton Correctional facility has already been held but contributions to help pay for the stamps and refreshments can still be made. In partnership with Elim Lutheran church, cookies, juice and packets of 3 Christmas cards with the envelopes stamped were provided to the 350 residences on Sunday evening, November 30. Participating from First Presbyterian was Don Fisher, Dana Hashman, Doug Smith, Shirley Stevens, Mickey Van Baale and George Wilkening.

Our national Presbyterian Church also offers us opportunities to give during this season. Did you know that you can purchase a mule, a goat, or a family of chickens for hungry people around the world through our denomination? Food Pantry Needs

We have been notified that the Salvation Army Food Pantry is almost empty. They are also out of meat in their freezer. They have had over 800 persons the past three months coming in for assistance. In the past the Army would go to the Food Bank in Des Moines, but they are also very low due to high use and the number of organizations coming to them. The Salvation Army has also assisted with the Wednesday night meals for anyone in the community who would like to come.

Another need provided by the Salvation Army is backpacks and school supplies and this is done in August. We find this to be a very busy time, and we haven't participated in this activity the past few years. The Mission committee feels this is a worthwhile project and have come up with a way we can help out. We are asking that on the last Sunday of the month, or any time you are able, school supplies also should be brought to the church. Since we have available rooms on the second floor, we will store these items and take them to the Salvation Army next August. Any type of school supply would be accepted - #2 pencils, crayons, colored pencils, notebooks, file folders, child scissors, glue sticks, Kleenex, or ear buds are just a few items that are needed. A separate basket or other type of container will be placed in the narthex. Please give generously and often of both food items and school supplies to help out our neighbors who may be in need.
