

Meghan's Musings

The Binding Agent We Call Love

First of all, for the benefit of any who might not have gotten the word yet, in January session voted to begin a gradual process of returning to in-person worship and something resembling "normalcy." Of course, there will be much more information on this in the coming weeks but the keys points to know now are: a target date of March 14 for our first return to "live" worship in the sanctuary. In-person worship will be held on the second and fourth Sundays of the month while worship will be virtual only on the first, third and fifth Sundays. Every effort at preventing the spread of COVID-19 will be taken including but not limited to: masks and social distancing required and there will be no congregational singing. On Sundays we are in the sanctuary we will continue to provide an online option for those who are uncomfortable or unable to join us in-person. Again, more details in the weeks to come.

Soon we will pass the one year mark of our pandemic experience. There has been so much suffering, loved ones lost, events missed, isolation, employment lost, financial hardship and so much more. And yet, in the midst of so much of our lives revolving around COVID-19—a term we never even heard of until some point in early 2020—from time to time we have been painfully reminded that people still suffer from other medical conditions, too. And there are lessons to be learned from those experiences as well. Lessons to help us in these difficult times that we would be wise to keep with us, even after this pandemic is behind us.

Rev. Jim Croom is an Episcopal priest who was adjunct faculty when I was in seminary. His wife, Rev. Stephanie Croom, is ordained in the Presbyterian church and also worked at SFTS in an administrative position, helping connect interns and churches, among other things. About two years ago, Jim was diagnosed with a form of cancer that he continues to be treated for. I was so moved by a recent journal entry he wrote on Caring Bridge that I wanted to share it with you (which I do with his permission). I've edited out some of the particulars of his diagnosis and treatment in order to lift up the highlights.

Hello Beloved Ones . . .

First of all, I need to say thank you from the depths of my heart. So many of you have been in touch, checked in with us . . . so many prayers, so much love. I hope you know, but if not, here it is, your gifts of contact, prayers and love freely offered us are changing our world. The people that you are change the whole world by the love you bring to it.

Just so you know, I am protective of "us" time—always have been, more so now. But, even so, I also know how important you are in all this. Stephanie and I have time for you. We are grateful for you. I have come to realize that you are great teachers. I am learning from this journey towards the end of my life that our relationships formed are from love for each other. You are teaching me about love. Stephanie teaches me every day about love. My daughter teaches me about love.


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My prayer has been for some time now that I be given enough time to prepare as best I can for the inevitable . . . so that I do not leave this world less well off, that I leave it better, and kinder or more loving. The things that I do now will change, perhaps in infinitesimally small ways, but change nonetheless, the world my Stephanie, my daughter and you will be left with.

And as dark as it all seems in the shadows being cast all 'round us, there is light and hope and beauty to be discovered. There is great power in the binding agent we call love. I have learned from you the power of love. This is the power we are granted by and graced with from God. I find in that power of love hope for the future . . . a future I may not get to know, but, as Dr. King said in the days now long ago, in that hope, in that hope we can see the Promised Land. I do know that, through the love so lovingly given, I can affirm that, like Dr. King, I have seen that Promised Land.

I suspect there are few things in life that help us to clearly see what is most important in our lives and focus in on them with laser-like precision than being forced to contemplate our own mortality whether because of a near brush with death or an inevitable decline of a terminal diagnosis or any other number triggers. For those of us fortunate enough not to have received these harsh calling cards (yet) my prayer is that we can be receptive pupils of those who have. From my friend Jim let us remember the power of checking in with those experiencing hardship whatever the cause. Let us remember the power of prayer—and not only prayer but also letting people *know* that we are praying for them. Let us remember the power of community. And let us remember, as my friend Jim so beautifully declares, "as dark as it all seems in the shadows being cast all 'round us, there is light and hope and beauty to be discovered. There is great power in the binding agent we call love." Amen.

What is UPP?

As mentioned in previous Messengers, the Presbytery of Des Moines is now sharing the executive staff with Prospect Hill and North Central Presbyteries. It has been decided this newly formed group will be referred to UPP, which stands for United Presbyteries of the Plains. In addition to the 5 shared positions, there is one commission, the Personnel Commission, that oversees many of the workings of the Executive staff.

Mickey Van Baale is a member of the UPP Personnel Commission. The group consists of 3 individuals from each presbytery serving a 3-year rotation. There is a Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Secretary, each serving a one-year term and each being from a different presbytery.

Some of the functions of this group are developing an employee handbook, hiring the permanent Office Administrator and the Program and Communication Administrator, finding the office for these executives and watching over the budget and expenses that are submitted. The Mission Executive, Amgad Beblawi, and Pastor to the Presbyteries, Ian McMullen, plan to work out of the new office, as well as the Office Administrator and Program and Communication Administrator. Annika Lister Stroope, Stated Clerk and Administrative Executive will be working remotely for the most part.

As we begin this new vision, please keep everyone involved in your prayers. The eyes of all Presbyteries in the country are on us, seeing if this innovative new model works and might be something they want to use.

All served last year and were re-elected. We will continue to use Dimensions Accounting for reconciling the monthly bank statements, figuring and paying quarterly taxes and preparing W2 forms at the end of the year.

What exactly is the per capita?

Every Presbyterian Church (USA) congregation is asked to pay a per-member assessment (per capita). Per capita is not membership dues. About thirteen years ago, the General Assembly approved the following definition of per capita: "Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian Church through the governing bodies to participate equally, responsibly, and independently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a reformed church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians." In short, per capita is the way churches share in the work of the wider church family: the Presbytery of Des Moines, General Assembly (national level) as well as the international mission. Assessing based on membership makes it equitable across churches. Some of each member's assessment goes to each level of governance: Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly.

It was voted at the November Presbytery meeting to leave the Per Capita assessment at \$45.00 per person for the year 2021. This is not per family, but per member of the church. Please make your check out to First Presbyterian Church and mark "per capita" in the memo section. In turn, our church will submit our assessments to the Presbytery.

The breakdown of the \$45 is as follows:

GA \$8.98

Synod \$5.50

Presbytery \$30.52
