Meghan's Musings Finding our "Why?"

In recent years there's been a new buzz phrase in businesses, organizations and the self-help industry: find your "why". The idea is that in order to do what we do effectively, we need to know WHY we are doing it and what our purpose is. In a church, this "why" or "purpose" can be summed up in a Mission Statement.

Last month at the officer retreat, our session and deacons began to consider possibilities for a new Mission statement for the church. The Mission statement we have been using was written about ten years ago by the pastor nominating committee. It's a lovely statement, however, it's due for an update.

A few years ago, Session read Canoeing the Mountains in which Presbyterian pastor Tod Bolsinger writes:

"When I work with clients in brining transformation, I facilitate a half-day exercise based on the work of the Mulago Foundation, a nonprofit venture capital firm that funds projects for combating children in poverty [sic. I'm pretty sure it fights the poverty, not the children]. Mulago requires grant applicants to write a simple proposal with an eight-word mission statement. The statement must be in this format: verb, target, outcome. And it can used only eight words. Some of the examples offered are, 'Save endangered species from extinction' and 'Improve African children's health.' When I have done this exercise with church leaders, they chafe under the demand of limited words. But it forces a conversation that help build the adaptive functioning: what words are most important? What are we really all about?"

Session and Deacons have brainstormed possibilities at their retreat and the rest of the congregation was invited to join the fun in worship the Sunday of the annual meeting. If you didn't get the chance to submit something and would like to or if you've thought of something new, please let me know. What's your idea for what our mission statement in eight or fewer words. (ok, ok. You can have 9 or 10 if absolutely necessary but no more!)

As Session and I continue to work on discerning our Mission Statement for the next season in the life of FPCN, each of these contributions will be taken into consideration. Thank you for your participation.

Is that even Presbyterian?

At our annual congregational meeting I told everyone to fasten their seatbelts because I had a big announcement. At this year's officer retreat, Session decided to try going committee-free for a year. I know, I know, how can we even call ourselves Presbyterian if we don't have committees. Surely committees are commanded somewhere in the Bible, or at least the Book of Order. Well, believe it or not, there is no requirement to have committees in a church.

I have a friend and colleague whose church is very similar to ours. As the church membership was declining and aging, the pool of people willing and able to serve on Session, Deacons and various committees also got smaller and smaller. Those who were willing and able were burning out and people were reluctant to commit to serve on committees for an entire year, much less three, much much less indefinitely.

So they tried going committee-free. Instead of multiple committees meeting monthly, each Session member has an area they were responsible for and when a specific need arises, they form a "task force" that has a specific task and timeframe. Have a mission activity coming up? Have a task for to coordinate it. Sanctuary needs to be decorated for Easter? Task force. Planning a potluck or Fourth of July parade activities? Task force. You get the idea.

While there's an open call to the whole congregation to serve on these task forces, there is also an intentional effort made for the session member responsible to not only invite the people who are known to have done it in the past, but also to invite people who maybe haven't been as active to give them a chance to get involved.

This committee-free way of being church works really well for my friend's congregation and I'm hoping it will work for us, too.

So how will this work? Following my friend's structure—at least to start though we can certainly make changes if/as we see fit—there will be three areas: Ministry to the Congregation (Worship & Music, Christian Nurture, Membership, Church Life), Ministry to the Community (Mission and the outreach portion of Membership) and Ministry of Support (Building & Grounds, Budget & Finance, Personnel).

There is one important exception. Because we do not currently have an individual serving as Treasurer, the Budget & Finance committee serves in the role and will need to remain a committee. But even with this committee, our hope is to streamline processes to have fewer meetings.

Together it is our hope that fewer meetings will mean more energy and enthusiasm for <u>being church</u> together.

Member Spotlight Joan Tyler
