

Dear Members and Friends of 1st Presbyterian Church of Newton, Iowa:

One will recall that when I first came to this church, I placed a hat on the chair near the pulpit only to be picked up when moving on to another interim ministry. Well, it is time to pick up the hat.

I have accepted an invitation to become the interim pastor at the 1st Presbyterian Church of Wahoo, Nebraska, just 40 minutes from my home in Lincoln, Nebraska. Consequently, Session has accepted with reluctance my resignation effective August 15, 2013. My last Sunday will be at the church picnic/worship service on August 11th.

I have enjoyed my ministry with this congregation and will cherish the precious relationships that I have made here. The joy will be discovering how God will reveal those opportunities to this congregation. May all eyes be lifted to the future with eyes fixed on God in Jesus Christ.

PNC Update: Just about the time we were ready to put the CIF (Church Information Form) on line, we found that a new form was developed named the MIF (Ministry Information Form) and would replace the CIF as of 8-1-13. Long story short—we went ahead and put the CIF online and then filled out the new MIF. This new form has been approved by our Session and has been sent to the Presbytery CCD (Congregational Care and Development) committee for approval at their July meeting. Once that is done, we will be able to put the MIF online. Also, we have received 30-35 PIF (Pastor Information Forms). Our committee has done an initial read through of these. We will be going over them more thoroughly, determining if any seem like someone we might be interested in. At any time we can make contact to obtain another batch of PIFs for review. We are also investigating the possibility of finding a regional "face-to-face" where we would be able to interview prospects in person.

Joplin Work Week: Linda Erickson will be taking a group of 4-6 to Joplin the end of July. They will be doing kitchen duty and possibly some cleaning. There are plans for about 300 people to be in Joplin that week to help on the rebuilding.

International:

El Salvador – There was a solicitude from Muñoces for \$50 for food and fireworks needed for the celebration of their patron saint on June 13. Our committee donated this money.

Community Meals

First Presbyterian will be participating in the Community meals this summer. If you are not familiar with this program, it has been held at First United Methodist on Wednesday nights as a free meal for those wanting socialization and needing a meal. The summer program is being held at Sacred Heart Church. We were asked to help during the summer. Mission committee agreed to give it a try. There will be 4 churches participating which gives us 2 Wednesday nights during the summer.

We have been assigned July 17 and July 31. The meals are simple, but we will need to provide about 4 hours in the afternoon for preparation and about 3 hours in the evening for serving and cleanup. Disposable plates will be used so dishwashing will be at a minimum. Plans are for about 100 people being served each Wednesday. We will be providing the menu weekly in case there are any of our members or guests who would enjoy an evening with others.

The last meal of the summer will be August 14 which will involve all 4 churches. It will be a salad supper so we will be asking for donations of salads for that meal. We need to provide 1 meat salad, 1 fruit salad, and 2 vegetable salads. Each salad needs to serve 25. The committee will do the preparation, but we will need donations. If you can help on the 31st or can provide one of the salads we need, please contact me.

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of May were \$10,159. This was \$1591 below budget for the month. Other Regular Giving for the month continues to run above budget and was \$526 above budget for the month of May.

Expenses are \$2,520 under budget.

Year-to-date, pledges through May were \$1,120 higher than budgeted and expenses were \$2,520 under budget.

The Capital Development Fund received \$3850 from the Foundation investments. Of this, \$918.71 was paid for electrical installation related to the new sign.

The Sundays at 4 received contributions of \$215. They made a \$50 contribution to the Newton Senior High Chorale and paid \$100 to Central College to cover mileage expense for their participation in the Sundays at 4 event.

Building and Grounds

The Building and Grounds Committee has been busy. We have secured funding and will soon be replacing the carpet in Fellowship Hall with carpet matching that in the hall and on the stairs. We are working on finding a date for this to happen, so be on the watch for a "work weekend" when we remove all the books and book cases so the old carpet can be removed. New carpet will likely happen sometime in July, possibly early August.

We are concerned about the overgrown shrubs and trees and are seeking opinions and bids on cutting back some and/or removing a tree or 2. We are also looking for some volunteer labor to lay mulch and help trim some of the smaller shrubs. If you have a couple of hours to spare call Linda Campbell for directions on what should be trimmed, and so there will be mulch delivered to spread.

We plan on repainting the parking lines in the parking lot this summer, and are considering the possibilities of also painting a labyrinth there. Many things need to happen before this is a reality, like a plan and design, a template and the labor lined up to get it done, but we are dreaming!

Recently we hired M and G Laundry to place a clean mat in the kitchen every 2 weeks. The cost is minimal and we can expand the agreement for more mats if the season or circumstance demands or return to using our own mats.

We continue to monitor mundane stuff like HVAC filters, replacing light bulbs, weed control and other matters necessary to keep our church running smoothly and looking its best.

Along with our church family, the Deacons mourn the death of Helen Wallace whom we had the privilege of visiting since she moved to Park Centre. Helen had been a deacon at one time. We also send our best wishes to 2 others we have visited and who were active members of First Presbyterian. In May John and LaVonne Erickson moved to a nursing home facility in Georgia to be nearer their family.

2013 Work Week Trip

By the time you receive this edition of the Messenger, we will be about ready to load up the cargo van, jump in the Suburbans, and head east to Benton Harbor. We hope you will keep us in your prayers during this time. Again, we are leaving Saturday morning, July 6 and will be home on Saturday, July 13.

We did find out what work we will be doing on this mission trip. We will mainly be working with the Boys and Girls Club of Benton Harbor. **Monday - Tuesday mornings from 9:30 - 11:30**: Building herb garden boxes for the Benton Harbor Boys and Girls Club at the Boys and Girls Club site. **Monday - Friday mornings from 9:30 - 11:30**: Some people could work at the MOSAIC resale store helping with sorting clothing, books, etc. This work will be done alongside BH residents who are employed there. **Monday - Fridays from 12 noon - 5 p.m.:** Work at the Boys and Girls Club in Benton Harbor assisting in their programming with 350 children. Also during this week, there will be about 30 9-10 year olds doing a special drama workshop that will end up having a performance at the college Mendel Center on Friday. Some with music and theatrical skills may be helping with this.

We will be exploring the dunes of Lake Michigan on Sunday afternoon and evening, after church. On Friday, the 12th, we will be pulling up stakes and going to Chicago to take in a Cubs/Cards game that afternoon. We will then travel to Naperville, IL to spend the night.

Larry Anderson - 521-1154 Dana Hashman - 521-8820 Linda Anderson - 521-1153 Mickey Van Baale - 521-0549 The following is an excerpt from the conclusion of a book entitled "On God's Side: What Religion Forgets and Politics Never Learned About Serving the Common Good" by Jim Wallis, CEO and editor of Sojourners, a Christian journal. I found it both practical and challenging.

The common good and the quality of our life together will finally be determined by the personal decisions we all make. The "commons" — those places where we come together as neighbors and citizens to share public space — will never be better than the quality of human life, or the human flourishing, in our own lives and households.

Here are ten personal decisions you can make to help foster the common good.

- 1. If you are a father or a mother, make your children the most important priority in your life and build your other commitments around them. If you are not a parent, look for children who could benefit from your investment in their lives.
- 2. If you are married, be faithful to your spouse. Demonstrate your commitment with both your fidelity and your love. If you are single, measure your relationships by their integrity, not their usefulness.
- 3. If you are a person of faith, focus not just on what you believe but on how you act on those beliefs. If you love God, ask God how to love your neighbor.
- 4. Take the place you live seriously. Make the context of your life and work the parish that you take responsibility for.
- 5. Seek to develop a vocation and not just a career. Discern your gifts as a child of God, not just your talents, and listen for your calling rather than just looking for opportunities. Remember that your personal good always relates to the common good.
- 6. Make choices by distinguishing between wants and needs. Choose what is enough, rather than what is possible to get. Replace appetites with values, teach your children the same, and model those values for all who are in your life.
- 7. Look at the business, company, or organization where you work from an ethical perspective. Ask what its vocation is, too. Challenge whatever is dishonest or exploitative and help your place of work do well by doing good.
- 8. Ask yourself what in the world today most breaks your heart and offends your sense of justice. Decide to help change that and join with others who are committed to transforming that injustice.
- 9. Get to know who your political representatives are at both the local and national level. Study their policy decisions and examine their moral compass and public leadership. Make your public convictions and commitments known to them and choose to hold them accountable.
- 10. Since the difference between events and movements is sacrifice, which is also the true meaning of religion and what makes for social change, ask yourself what is important enough to give your life to and for.

Finding the integral relationship between your own personal good and the common good is your best contribution to our future. And it is the best hope we have for a better life together.

The only improvement I would make on this list is in item 1: "If you are a father or mother and you live with a spouse and children, make your relationship with your partner the first priority and your children a close second."

Meet Francisca Araceli Munoz

One of the scholarship students this year from Muñoces is Francisca Araceli Munoz. Francisca is the daughter of Juan Ernesto Munoz and Milagro del Carmen Mejia and the family has always lived in Muñoces. When we first visited the family they had some chickens in a pen which was unusual... usually the chickens roam freely around the house. When asked why the chickens were in pens they explained that there had been a hawk stealing the chickens so they had built the pens. Milagro sells lotions from her home to help with the income from subsistence farming. Although Francisca is 21 years old she is still striving to continue her education so she is going back to high school this year with the help of a scholarship from First Presbyterian. Here is her application letter:

Dear and esteemed Ladies and Gentlemen of the First Presbyterian Church. Receive a friendly greeting wishing all of you are well on this precious day. The reason for writing this letter is to tell you all that I need help in order to be able to study in the National Institute of Berlín because I have lots of economic problems. Because of this I decided to write to you in order that you might help me with a scholarship. I hope that all-powerful God blesses all of you and is with you always.
