

Meghan's Musings

Cultivating Joy

In a recent sermon based on Isaiah 35: 1-10 I invited you to cultivate joy. It's something most of us probably don't spend a lot of time thinking about. We tend to confuse "happiness" with "joy" and perhaps we even think that "joy" is a condition we have very little power over whether or not we have it.

It's probably no surprise that over the last year and a half or so, there has been a drastic increase in the rates of anxiety, depression, drug overdoses, alcoholism and violence. All this in addition to the more obvious collective trauma caused by the pandemic. And let's be honest, as a whole, we probably weren't in the greatest mental/emotional health even before the pandemic.

In a recent story on National Public Radio (NPR) reporter Michaeleen Doucleff noted that, "Although some people are starting to test the waters of public life again, planning vacations and socializing more, others may still have lingering signs of what psychologists call languishing. They may feel an emptiness or dissatisfaction in day-to-day life. Or feel like they're stuck in weariness or stagnation."

So how do we address this languishing? Emptiness? Dissatisfaction? Weariness? Stagnation? Well, one way is through cultivating joy. In fact, the good folks at National Public Radio developed a "joy generator" app just for that purpose. Through the app you can practice joy by listening to sounds that have been shown to elicit calm or even euphoria: such as the sound of a paint brush, cutting into a cupcake, or playing with slime. Or you can listen to sounds of nature, or look at videos of cute animals (puppies, kittens, more puppies or more kittens). They also have a guide to make it easy to write our feelings through poetry and a variety of other joyful activities can be found on the NPR Joy Generator. (You can check it out at www.npr.org/joy)

All-church Pool Party



NHS Hall of Fame Inductees

The purpose of the NHS Hall of fame is to honor individuals and organizations that have made exceptional achievements in their field, significant contributions to Newton High School, or unique contributions to their communities at the local, state, national or international levels. Ongoing annual selections for the Hall of Fame will recognize and encourage Newton high School's tradition of excellence. This was started in 2014 and the inductees are recognized at the all school brunch held at the High School on the Saturday of Alumni weekend, the second weekend in June.

How exciting it was this year to have 2 of the inductees be members of First Presbyterian Church— Tom Weeks and Dan Skokan. The write-ups below and on the next page are courtesy of the High School and are what appeared in the newspaper. Congratulations, gentlemen

Tom Weeks

WHO-TV's Keith Murphy has referred to Tom as "Mr. Newton".

Tom is a 1967 graduate of Newton High School. While at NHS, he served on the student council and was a seven-time varsity letter winner in football, basketball, and track as an athlete and student manager.

He graduated from Truman State University (Missouri) in 1972. While at Truman, he was named Lt. Governor for the Missouri-Arkansas district for Circle K, a college division of Kiwanis International. After working a short while in southern California, Tom came home to work in marketing and sales for the Maytag Co. Tom left Maytag in 2004 and has been with Newton schools ever since.

Tom was also involved with Boy Scouts for nearly 20 years. He was an assistant scout master and helped mentor 56 young men to the rank of Eagle Scout.

Since 1979, Tom has been a five-time cancer survivor. In 1992, he was diagnosed with stage four lymphoma. This experience inspired him to go forth and live life to the fullest.

Tom has always been active in the Newton community and its schools. He is a two-time past president of the Newton Community Theater. He was named "Distinguished Past President" of Newton Noon Kiwanis Club by the Iowa-Nebraska district of Kiwanis International. While he was president, the club created the Newton "Golden K" Club. Tom also started the Builders Club at Berg Middle School. Additionally, he reinstated the Key Club at Newton High School, in which his son Steve, has been a long-time advisor to the club.

Tom's abiding love has been Newton athletics. For the past 41 years, he has been a volunteer and/or an assistant coach for track, cross country, football, and basketball. He joined the football staff as an assistant coach in the late 1990s where he has been involved in football operations, statistics, and the team's kicking coach. In the past 15 years, he is proud to say, he had seven All District kickers, and two All State kickers. Two of his kickers advanced to play at the Division One level. One became an NCAA all-American and ended up playing in the NFL for the Buffalo Bills.

But Tom says it was not as a kicker that he accomplished these goals, although Tim would like to feel he contributed to his NFL success. Tom also spent 11 years as an assistant basketball coach. This is where he was a part of the 2017 Newton state tournament team.

Tom is one of six generations of his family to attend and graduate from Newton High School. This includes his mother Mary Jean (Class of 1946); sister Nancy (class of 1971); wife Susan (class of 1974). Additionally, sons, Tom, Jr. who is in the NHS Hall of Fame, (class of 2001); Steve, (class of 2004); and Ukrainian daughter, Alla, who attended NHS in 1993-94. Now his granddaughters are students in Newton Schools.

Danny Del Skokan

Dan Skokan started school in Newton after moving with his family from Alliance, Nebraska in 1962. He attended Newton schools 8-12th grades and graduated from Newton High School with the class of 1966. While in high school Dan attended Hawkeye Boys State, played in the orchestra as a violinist, was inducted into Delta Mu Delta National Honor Society, and was a Maytag Scholarship recipient. He went on to receive a Bachelor of Science degree with honors from Iowa State University in 1970, majoring in Business with minors in Accounting and Industrial Administration. After graduating Dan sat for and passed the CPA Exam becoming a Certified Public Accountant. Dan was in the Reserve Officers' Training Corp while attending Iowa State from 1966-1970. He served active duty in the Adjutant General Branch of the United States Army and was the Chief Accounting Officer at Fort Wolters, Texas from 1970-1971.

Upon returning to Iowa, Dan worked for Coopers & Lybrand in Des Moines from 1972-1975. From 1975-2000, Dan worked for and became an owner/partner of Humiston, Skokan, Warren & Eichenberger CPAs with offices in Des Moines and Newton. He served as Managing Partner from 1996-2000. In 2000 he merged his firm with RSM McGladrey where he served as a director. He retired from McGladrey and Public Accounting in 2003.

Dan's remaining career was dedicated to making a difference in the nonprofit business world. He became CEO of Progress Industries in Newton in 2003 and worked until retiring again in 2015. He enjoyed the opportunity to help improve the lives of individuals with disabilities. He was known for his financial expertise, compassion, empathy and dedication to service during his time at Progress Industries. A sculpture of helping hands was added to the facility to portray the power of everyone working together for success in life. He retired again in 2015 remaining on numerous boards.

Dan has been affiliated professionally with The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Iowa Society of Certified Public Accountants. Dan was honored with the 2011 Public Service Award by the Iowa Society of CPAs for his outstanding contributions to the community and efforts to enhance the professional image of CPAs.

He has served on many boards including the Newton Development Corporation, the Jasper Community Foundation, the Geisler Penquite Foundation, Progress Industries, PI Foundation, Skiff Medical Center, Community Support Advocates, United Way of Central Iowa, Polk County Health Services and the Mental Health Association in Polk County.
