

Meghan's Musings

As you might imagine, almost every session meeting since March 2020 has involved some discussion of if/when/how to return to the kind of worship and church life to which we are accustomed. With recent CDC guidelines loosening up and considering the high percentage of our church family known to be fully vaccinated, Session has made some changes.

As with every pandemic-related decision, it is inevitable that these actions will be considered too small by some and too big by others. Since the CDC stated that fully vaccinated individuals may safely stop wearing masks, somehow that has been interpreted as "no one needs to wear masks anymore." However, as of this week, Jasper County has only a 39% vaccination rate. And yes, many of the remaining 61% of unvaccinated residents are children who either only recently became eligible for vaccination or are not yet eligible for vaccination. Yet, those of us who are fully vaccinated live in the same community and interact with those 61%. And just as importantly if not more, we love our children and don't want them getting COVID either.

While vaccinations do sharply decrease the chance of getting COVID, it is still possible to get the virus even after being fully vaccinated. Indeed, this happened to someone many of us know, a former interim pastor of this church. Furthermore, this week Jasper County declined to accept vaccination doses due to lack of demand. The week before we accepted only part and the week before that also none. So that 39% is not going to be moving up much or quickly.

So, taking all of this information into account along with the longing in each of our hearts to worship God together and see our church family in person, these are the changes Session has approved:

- 1) Starting in June we will be back in the sanctuary every week. In order to be fully welcoming to all regardless of vaccination status, we will continue with the current protocols regarding masks, distancing and, for the time being, no congregational singing. In order to include those who are still unable to or uncomfortable with returning to in-person worship, the services will be recorded and posted on our website and on Facebook as soon as possible following worship.
- 2) Communion will be prepared wearing gloves and mask and distributed with one piece of glutenfree bread and half a grape in a small disposable cup. Worshippers will come up the south aisle and go back via the north aisle (so everyone is moving counter-clockwise). The grape is halved for the sake of the kiddos to avoid choking hazard.
- 3) After worship, outdoor fellowship time (without food or beverage) will be encouraged. Bring your own chair if you want one.
- 4) Session will be returning to in-person meetings beginning in June and has also lifted prohibition of in-person committee meetings. If everyone on a committee feels comfortable meeting (assuming all are vaccinated) that's fine. If most members want to meet in person but one or more prefer Zoom, we can accommodate that, too.

We will not be changing our time of worship for the summer, as has been done in the past. Session voted to have worship remain at 10:30 am.





George Henry Wilkening was born and raised in Hayesville, Iowa to a farming family in a small farming community (population 50 in 2021). He is the youngest of 3 boys born to the family. He attended a two room school house through 8th grade, then went to high school in Sigourney, where his first interests in Science and Math became known to him, graduating in 1963.



during the Vietnam war was a worry because of the draft so he stopped his studies to be with his wife Sharon (married May 29, 1969). Fortunately the draft only went up to #195. With that good news, he returned to school in Columbia while Sharon was teaching the cream of the 6th grade crop in the little community of Ashland, MO.

Upon graduation George started applying for teaching positions. Fortunately for Newton, George was interviewed and hired to teach 8th grade Math and Science at Central Junior High where now stands the Newton Library. When that school was closed, George took his knowledge and love of students to Newton High School where he continued his career as a Physics and Science teacher until his retirement.

Because his wife Sharon was a Presbyterian, when they arrived in Newton they checked out the two Presbyterian churches. After coming into contact with a group of 1st Presbyterian "Mariners," they decided to join our church. When Rev. Bill Sexton baptized George many years ago, he was given the full treatment... so much water was used that it ran from his head, down his back all the way to his waist. George believed Rev. Sexton thought he needed a thorough cleaning as he started his new life.

Soon thereafter George and Sharon's family was blessed with the adoption of Dianna in 1977 and son Craig in 1979. In 1980 George was elected to (and was the youngest persons to serve on) the Session. Also at that time there wasn't a young people's Sunday school class or nursery, so with volunteers George and Sharon started the Sunday school class which George continues to lead. An impressive 41 years!

During these early years George tells of the time when Dr. Moles suddenly left the service to attend an accident. Apparently Craig, rounding the corner in the basement hit a wall and knocked himself out. Fortunately our congregant doctor was present to restore the young lad.

George's travel had to take place in the summer due to teaching but then he was able to combine camping vacations with workshops and educational experiences to NASA in Huntsville, AL., the Colorado School of Mines and also The Maytag Company as a summer employee, exploring student preparation for work required by the company. George was highly regarded as a teacher and had families express their hopes that he'd never leave teaching.

He has sung solos for weddings, funerals and many other church events. One of the pieces we've all heard him sing is "The Lord's Prayer," with its thrilling climax at the end... 
Zoom Happy Hour Open House

Days for Girls International – Newton IA Team have met together twice now and it feels so good to re-connect with those who feel able to come.



Report of the 523rd Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Des Moines Mickey Van Baale, Commissioner

The meeting was held via Zoom on Tuesday, May 18. Rev. Meghan Davis, Linda Curtis-Stolper and myself were in attendance. We followed the new format of having the business portion of the meeting interspersed with the worship.

The first part of the meeting was to be a time of breaking into small groups and discussing ideas for a name change for our Presbytery. Rather than that, Sandy Wagener shared the history of our Presbytery. I have a copy if anyone is interested in reading it.

With every motion unanimously passing, the meeting went along very smoothly. Some of the highlights were:

- The August 21 Presbytery meeting is being moved to September 18 and will be a Tri-Presbytery Gathering. The location is yet to be determined.
- The Crisis Team, which was established with the onset of COVID-19, determined that all committees, commissions and task forces may meet in person using CDC guidelines and must include an option to attend virtually. Also, once fully vaccinated, staff members may attend functions in person.
- Candidate Hannah Lundberg was approved to seek a call and negotiate for service. For the next two years she will be at the Parish Ministry Residency Program at First Presbyterian Church in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Linda Curtis-Stolper is Moderator of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, which has been helping Hannah.
- We heard a report from the Commission on Ministry, of which Rev. Meghan Davis-Brass is a member, of several ministers either accepting calls at churches, serving as temporary supply or Moderators for some and unfortunately of a dissolution of the call between Rev. Ben Nti and the Malcom First Presbyterian Church.
- Heard a beautiful meditation by Rev. Nicole Wegele of First Presbyterian Church in Dallas Center on "Listening".
- Learned that the Personnel Commission is actively looking for an Office Manager. The
 office will be located at the Lakeshore Center office at Okoboji, as the three commissioners
 are finding it best to work remotely from their homes. Mickey Van Baale is a member of
 this commission.
- The former office of the Des Moines Presbytery in Urbandale is being listed for sale. Any paper files that need to be kept will be stored at a church in Des Moines, to be determined. No furniture or storage files have been sold yet, waiting to see if whomever buys the condo will also want the furniture. If not, these items will be sold.
- The Manse in Indianola is being sold and the congregation will go to the format of allowing their minister a housing allowance.
- Two mission trips are just starting to be worked on. One would be yet this year to Mexico and the other in 2022 to Palestine.
- The Des Moines Presbytery has a new website. The address is the same: dmpresbytery.org.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:20 pm. It still amazes me that we can get all of the business done via Zoom in about 3 hours that took us twice as long (not counting lunch) in person.
