Lenten Disciplines

On Transfiguration Sunday (the last Sunday before Lent) I encouraged the congregation, as I do every year, to take on a Lenten discipline.

The season of Lent offers us an opportunity to really focus on our faith, on our relationship with God and even on our relationship with the church family in a special way that no other time in the church year does. So this year, I'm inviting you to enter willingly into the valley of Lent. And rather than "giving up" something for Lent, I'd like to invite you to "show up" for Lent. Show up for worship, perhaps challenge yourself to come for worship every Sunday in Lent. Perhaps challenge yourself to get up early and show up for the Lenten breakfast. Every Lenten breakfast. Every week. Or participate in the evening Lenten Devotion and Study on Wednesday evenings. Or perhaps show up for the special services at the beginning and end of Lent: Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, the Cross Walk on Good Friday. Perhaps challenge yourself to show up for church life activities. Show up for worship and fellowship opportunities that you might not have otherwise. Show up and see how you might be changed.

But if you still feel like you need to give something up, perhaps be guided by these words from Pope Francis:

Do you want to fast this Lent?

*Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
*Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
*Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
*Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
*Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.
*Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
*Fast from bitterness and fill your heart with joy.
*Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
*Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
*Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

In our Transfiguration Sunday scripture from Matthew, Jesus tells his friends: Get up and do not be afraid! I would like to add: Get up and show up! Show up and be transformed! Get up and do not be afraid!

519th Presbytery Meeting Report

February 8, 2020 Covenant Presbytery Church West Des Moines, Iowa

Rev. Meghan Davis, Linda Curtis-Stolper and I attended the meeting. Highlights of the meeting were:

- Very moving worship service entitled "Hope in the Midst of Change" with the message presented by Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka.
- A presentation by Rev. Dr. Rodger Nishioka entitled "21st Century Reformation: Seven Trends that are changing and challenging the church." Nishioka serves as the senior associate pastor at Village Presbyterian Church in Prairie Village, KS. Prior to his joining the ministry at Village, he served for 15 years as the Benton Professor of Christian Education at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, GA. He is a very dynamic speaker one I wish everyone had the opportunity of hearing. The seven trends he spoke on were:
 - 1. From tribal education to immigrant education.
 - 2. From Mission out there to Mission right here.
 - 3. From reasoned spirituality to mystery-filled spirituality.
 - 4. From mass evangelism to one-on-one evangelism.
 - 5. From credentialed leadership to gifted leadership.
 - 6. From high tech to high touch (Used the new Google commercial as an example).
 - 7. From discipleship to apostleship. Disciples come together Apostles go out.
- Heard, discussed and voted on two overtures that were passed and will be sent to General Assembly for the next General Assembly meeting. One was on The Presbyterian Climate Accord and the other on Fossil Fuel Divestment.
- Learned we have a candidate, Amy McGriff, from First Presbyterian Church in Oskaloosa, that will be enrolled as an Inquirer in seeking to become a Minister of Word and Sacrament. (Teaching Elder)
- The COM (Commission on Ministry) reported on a variety of topics which included new liaisons to make biennial visits to churches; adopted a Code of Ethics for Ruling and Teaching Elders; granted the status of honorably retired to 3 ministers; and gave the dates of some upcoming meetings and training sessions.

The next meeting will be in May. The location is yet to be determined.

<u>About the book</u>: "Antiracism is a transformative concept that reorients and reenergizes the conversation about racism - and, even more fundamentally, points us toward liberating new ways of thinking about ourselves and each other. At it's core, racism is a powerful system that creates false hierarchies of human value; its warped logic extends beyond race, from the way we regard people of different ethnicities or skin colors to the way we treat people of different sexes, gender identities, and body types. Racism intersects with class and culture and geography and even changes the way we see and value ourselves. In *How to Be an Antiracist*, Kendi takes readers through a widening circle of antiracist ideas - from the most basic concepts to visionary possibilities - that will help readers see all forms of racism clearly, understand their poisonous consequences, and work to oppose them in our systems and in ourselves. Kendi weaves an electrifying combination of ethics, history, law, and science with his own personal story of awakening to antiracism. This is an essential work for anyone who wants to go beyond the awareness of racism to the next step: contributing to the formation of a just and equitable society." (from <u>amazon.com</u>)
