

A few weeks ago, Larry Anderson sent me some thoughts with no particular plan of how to share it with our church family. I was moved by the sentiments and thought it well-worth sharing in a place of prominence and suggested it be included on the front page of the Messenger.

But first, on a totally unrelated topic: I've never been part of a formal book club, though it always sounded like something I'd enjoy. However, I find I don't have the time to read the thousands of books I want to read, much less stuff I'm not particularly interested in hence: **What the Pastor's Reading** aka A Super Low Maintenance Book Club. I tell you what I'm reading, if you so desire, you can read the book as well and join me for discussion. Reading is one of the most important responsibilities of a pastor and it's also the easiest to put off. So this is a way to keep myself accountable to reading at least one book a month, even if no one else shows up for discussion, but if others do participate, so much the better!

I'll be reading a wide variety of books including but not limited to church "business", spirituality, social justice and fiction. These will be, for the most part, books off my shelf (books I've purchased or received that have been waiting for my attention, in some cases for years). I'll be at Uncle Nancy's the last Saturday of the month at 11:30 am (after yoga). The time and place are negotiable so if you're interested but the time doesn't work for you, let me know. The first three books will be:

March 26—*City of God: Faith in the Streets* by Episcopal Priest Sara Miles, a memoir of Ash Wednesday on the streets of San Francisco.

April 30—*God's Brain* by Lionel Tiger and Michael McGuire, a look at religion from a biological/psychological point of view

May 28—*The Invention of Wings*, by Sue Monk Kidd, described by Oprah as "A remarkable novel that heightened my sense of what it meant to be a woman—slave or free... A conversation changer."

Not only do many younger adults forego church involvement – many of my generation who once did attend church no longer do. I've had many conversations with people about why this is. There have been multitudes of studies about why this is. And I have to say I have some empathy for some people's lack of enthusiasm for the church. There have been occasions when I've asked myself why I stay in church. While there is something to be said for the benefits of affiliation and identification with groups in general, at some point one must ask what are the peculiar benefits of participation in a church – that is, benefits that are not available in any other human institution.

I've been thinking about this lately, as I see the weekly attendance at worship hover around 60, with perhaps a third of that number sitting in the choir loft. I know – church attendance is not the only measure of commitment to membership. But I find myself wondering why individuals and families who used to attend our church regularly are now seldom present. For me, despite my occasional frustrations and doubts about church, worship is a pretty meaningful experience. I find Meghan's preaching stimulating and growth-producing. As you might guess, I find the music of worship to be nourishing. But these by themselves would probably not be enough to keep me coming. There is something more important and more foundational.

What does it mean to be a member of the church? In many ways it's similar to membership in any other human organization – except that in many other organizations, *more* demands are put on the members than in church. But the distinctiveness of church is that we are, collectively, the body of Christ. We embody Christ. We are the presence of Christ to each other and in our wider community.

This is not an easy thing. We are challenged every day by competing demands, and it is all too easy to be distracted from this primary calling. We can be annoyed, irritated, and hurt by each other. We are confronted by illness, loss, evil in society, and the evil that lies within our own natures. We are wounded, we may lose hope, we may be tempted to denial and to pretending it really doesn't matter what we do.

A passage from the book of Hebrews has always been meaningful to me, and I ran across it recently as part of the day's devotional reading:

“And let us consider how to spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another . . .”
Hebrews 10:24,25

Do you see the connection? In the struggle to be authentic human beings and followers of Jesus, we need one another. When I see you – especially when I see you in church – I am seeing Christ. And when I don't see you, I miss the particular manifestation of the presence of Christ that you are. Do I always have this perspective and act in accordance with it? Of course not. But that is my goal, because it's what I believe. It's also what I've experienced over and over in our church.

So my hope is that more people will come to worship on Sunday morning, and that, when we are together, Christ will appear to us in the person of our neighbor in the pew.

There are many things within our church that just sort of happen and one of those is contacting members to make breakfast and/or do devotions on Wednesday mornings during Lent. A big thank you again to Mary Jane Tripp for taking care of this.

We held our meeting on February 21. Following devotions, reports were given on January visits, which were done by last year's partners. New partners will begin with February visits. Rev. Meghan Davis gave a report on those members she had visited and asked if there was anyone else needing a visit.

Shirley Stevens reported she sent out 38 cards in January. Discussion was held on each Deacon writing out a card to go with flowers that are given by a church member, rather than having Jenny do this.

The group approved donating money to buy a bag of both types of fertilizer for a family in Muñoces. Also, it was unanimously approved to donate \$25 to each of the graduating seniors from Muñoces.

Emergency Closure of the Church

With the arrival of winter weather, we have reviewed and updated our policies at First Presbyterian. In the event of severe weather, any changes to scheduled activities at the church will be communicated to KCOB Radio. They have assured us such information will be sent out over all 3 of their stations (1280 AM, 95.9 FM and KRTI 106.7 FM which covers Grinnell, Marshalltown, parts of Des Moines, etc.) In addition we have established an account with KCCI Television and WHO Radio. When severe weather occurs, check these sources. If First Presbyterian is not mentioned on any of these, then there is no change in our plans. However, if you have any doubts, please err on the side of caution and be safe!

Budget and Finance Corner

Pledges for the month of January were \$33,237. This was \$3,067 above the amount we had budgeted. Of this amount, \$19,632 had been prepaid in 2015, but transferred into 2016 as pledge income. Other Regular Giving, which represents donations from people who tithe, but do not pledge, was \$560 for the month. We collected \$740 in per capita donations. In total for the month, expenses were \$463 over budget.

Administrative expenses were \$494 above budget due to higher copier usage in December, supplies for new session members and the purchase of a supply of coffee from Don Justo. Both the General Assembly mission payment (\$4,894) and the per capita payment (\$9,080) were remitted to Presbytery in January.

The Muñoces committee received donations of \$170 from donations and craft sales. The Deacon fund received contributions of \$34.

The Deacons are not part of our yearly budget, so they have to depend on these donations. Things the Deacons spend money on is help with projects for Muñoces, such as buying fertilizer or money to youth to further their education. They have expenses, such as cards and postage that are sent to church members for birthdays, thinking of you or get-well wishes. The Deacons are also very generous in supporting the Salvation Army and IMPACT to help with heating costs in the winter for those who are at risk of having their heat turned off. Report on Presbytery of Des Moines 503rd Stated Meeting February 13, 2016 Ankeny Presbyterian Church

The meeting was moderated for the first time by Ruling Elder Maurice Dyer and newly hired Stated Clerk, Dave Hamilton. It was held in Ankeny in a modern church, which used a screen. Music, mostly contemporary and jazz, was provided by a quartet.

The meeting began with a worship service. For the Confession of Sin, congregates were invited to come forward, dip their fingers in paint and write a sin on a long roll of paper. They then washed their hands, signifying the forgiveness of sin. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Dr. Sam Massey, formerly pastor at DM Westminster and now serving First Presbyterian in Iowa City. Communion was served by intinction with the choice of juice or wine.

Many reports were presented. I am including those that I think would be of most interest to our congregation.

Compassion, Peace and Justice Committee Task Force, moderated by Meghan Davis, presented its report. Compañeros gave its first annual report, complete with Our Sister Parish Newsletter and a slide show featuring photos of many of the partnership missions in El Salvador (pictures did not include Newton First.) The Committee urged the Presbytery of Des Moines to concur with an overture to General Assembly to divest of fossil fuel stocks. After a lengthy debate, a paper ballot vote was taken. Result-39 pro, 39 con with 1 abstention. Since a majority vote was needed to pass, the vote failed. Other presbyteries will also be voting on this issue.

New Sharon Administrative Commission Report. Moderator Mickey Van Baale. A slideshow was presented in order that commissioners could see the actual church, which is in a state of disrepair. Since the church, which currently has 3 members, has not held services since 2006, it has lost its tax-free status. However, there has been some dissention and hard feelings over closing the facility. The committee has worked with the church members and the city council and hopes to have the issue resolved so the church will be closed. There are pews, some windows, etc. which could be sold. In our denomination, the church building belongs to the Presbytery.

Nominating Committee Report. (Gary Parsons is a member.) There are quite a few openings. Committees need to be gender fair with a balance of teaching and ruling elders.

Interim General Presbytery Search Committee Report. Phil Barrett, who served as both Executive Presbyter and Stated Clerk, has retired. A search committee has been formed to seek an interim facilitator "in guiding the presbytery so that all voices will be heard in discovering its mission and in helping the presbytery identify the organizational and staffing structures necessary to execute that mission. Further the individual will guide the presbytery through changes to its mission, organization and staffing." If it is determined that a general presbyter is needed, the interim will not be eligible to fill that position.

CROSS Ministries Report. Roberta Victor, Director

On February 4, 2016, the Cross Ministries board voted to move their programs from Cottage Grove Mission Center to the offices of Impact Community Action Partnership. Reasons included similarities of programs, handicap accessibility, better space, availability of bus route, longer operating hours, increased morale, and free office space. While CM stated that they were thankful for Cottage Grove Councils.. and see potential in the renovation of Cottage Grove, CM faced "a dilemma." "Remaining at Cottage Grove in the hope that the Mission Center will come to fruition would require CM staff to work in an unsafe and unpleasant environment not ideally suited to the needs of our mission or up to the standards required by the Des Moines Area Religious Council or future grantors." CM had operated out of CG for 41 years. They will begin their new operation March 15.

Cottage Grove Presbyterian Mission Center Covenant Council Report.

The report was written before the Council was notified of Cross Ministries' decision. The Council will continue as best as they are able and focus on essential things only with a further report in May.

New Mission Activities-Sudanese Tutoring/ ESL Program with Drake University

Building Improvements: new insurance with Grinnell Mutual; improved Fellowship Hall; improved exterior lighting; more efficient heating system; some new flooring and painting. Sudanese and Arabic communities are holding services at CG. Presbytery office, which was to be moved to CG, is still at current location.

Budget and Finance (Cheryl Ritter is on this committee).

10 churches, including West Des Moines Covenant and Des Moines Westminster, are withholding their per capita payments (\$40 per member). Conversations are being held with the 2 larger churches. If they continue to withhold per capita pledges, Presbytery budget will need to be redone. A Property Committee will be formed and will report to Presbytery.

Church Professional Task Force Report

Joan White was recognized for her retirement as a Teaching Elder (pastor).

Committee on Preparation for Ministry

Jennifer Peek (Grinnell) was enrolled as a candidate for ministry under the care of the Presbytery of Des Moines. She read her statement of faith and was questioned on her candidacy.

The meeting was closed with prayer - and in proper Presbyterian order.

- ✦ Told of the activities of the Mission committee - fundraiser luncheon and program on February 28 after church and the collection of donations for One Great Hour of Sharing.



From its beginning, the Feeding America Backpack Program in the Newton Community School District has depended on volunteers. Groups like First Presbyterian Church have packed bags with food items for students to use over weekends and helped raise awareness and funds to support the program.

Newton's program started in Jan., 2013, with forty students at two schools receiving bags on the last school day of each week. Three years later, 117 students from all four elementary schools receive weekly bags, with more names on the waiting list. The Food Bank of Iowa currently has Feeding America Backpack Programs at 139 sites, serving over 5000 students.

As a result of the expansion of the program and in hopes of being able to serve more students in the future, the Food Bank of Iowa has found it necessary to change the way in which school programs are supplied. Pre-packed bags require less storage space at the Food Bank and in the schools, making delivery to schools much easier and making it feasible to continue increasing the number of students being served. This means volunteers are no longer needed to pack individual bags or to help with delivering bins to the schools.

First Presbyterian Church's assistance was instrumental in making the program work. The students, their families, school personnel, and the coordinating committee members offer their deepest appreciation and thanks for your commitment. As the Feeding America Backpack Program grows in the Newton Community School District, it will continue to be important that Newton supports the Food Bank of Iowa. Donations to the Food Bank of Iowa marked for "Newton Backpack Program" will be needed and appreciated.
