

Meghan's Musings

Rose, Bud, Thorn

As we approach the one year anniversary of our experience of the COVID-19 pandemic—something none of us ever would have guessed would happen in the first place, much less last this long once it did—I looked back to my first "Musings" of this era, back when we thought we'd be apart for just a few weeks or months at the most. At that time I shared my sermon from March 22, 2020, based on Psalm 23.

...in this challenging time, this time when we face an unprecedented reality of the novel coronavirus, COVID19, social distancing, social isolation, shelter-in-place in some states and communities, even as we face these realties, unimaginable even two weeks ago, we must turn to God, confident that even though we walk through the darkest valley, we have no evil to fear, Even though we walk through the darkest valley, God is with us; God's rod and staff—comfort us.

Of course, a year on and we still find ourselves in a dark valley, though perhaps not the darkest. On one hand, there are vaccines which many of us have been able to get and we hope soon anyone who wants to be vaccinated will be. But on the other hand, there are new variants of the virus some of which are more transmissible. Slowly we're beginning to inch back toward some semblance of "normal", but on the other hand we may still be wearing masks into 2022.

On one hand, we are dipping our toes in the water of "re-opening" with twice monthly in-person worship, on the other hand, we will be wearing masks, keep our distance from those we don't live with, be unable to sing hymns, hug or shake hands.

When Session decided to try this re-opening, we landed on the date March 14; without even realizing that it will be the one year anniversary of our first Sunday we weren't together. Nor did we realize it would be the Sunday of the time change which I hope doesn't complicate matters. And here we are.

As we approach this lamentable anniversary, I invite you to join me in reflecting on the past year. I've recently learned a reflection tool called: Rose, Bud, Thorn. The idea is to name one "rose", that is something positive; one "bud," which is an opportunity; and one "thorn," something difficult, challenging, perhaps even painful. Of course, you're welcome to name as many in each category as you like. I'll give you an example for myself.

Rose: Our YouTube numbers suggest that we've actually had more people "attending" worship than we typically have in our sanctuary. Also, our giving has remained strong thanks to the generosity of you: our church family.

Bud: I've been pushed into some new and creative ways to do worship. Also, the pandemic encouraged me to start "Read the Bible in a Year" which I've been intending to do for years and just hadn't gotten around to it.

Thorn: The obvious: not being able to see you all, hug you, visit you, even just have normal in-person meetings.

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

Meet Warren Erickson

Warren grew up in Waterloo, Iowa. His folks wanted him to become a performer . . . so piano, dance lessons and recitals were part of his young life. After declaring , "no more piano," a friend who played trumpet introduced Warren to the band teacher who said, "With those long arms, you look like a trombonist!"



Following graduation from college, with a teaching degree in music, Warren auditioned at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center and was accepted. For all four years of his Navy career he taught in the Naval School of Music in Washington D.C. and played in the Navy Band.

Upon discharge Warren returned to Iowa and for a short time taught instrumental music in the Iowa school system. He became interested in counseling and was eventually hired at the Newton Correctional Release Center near Newton where he helped develop a cognitive program helping inmates understand their criminality and corrections. He retired in 1998.

Music has been a constant accompaniment in his life, directing the First Presbyterian Church choir many years, The InPersons, a group of singers and instrumentalists who performed in and around Central Iowa, Newton Community Theater musicals and plays, several productions with the Newton Community Orchestra and Chorus of "Messiah," and other classical music.

The teacher who taught him trombone gave a gift that is still giving. Warren plays in the Iowa Military Veterans band, Grinnell College Band, Newton summer band and has played and arranged music for trombone groups.

Warren has always been physically active. During his working years, he would rise early, run before work and swim laps after work. Knees finally ended running but he still swims and figures he has completed several hundred miles. He learned to ride a bike as a kid and has continued to ride throughout his years and enjoys riding with the Presbyterian Peddlers.

Currently Warren shares his musical talents in worship and serves on the Membership Committee, the FPC Foundation Board and has served as a Deacon in the past. He and his wife Linda have been involved in the church's El Salvador Mission for 20 years. They have worked as election observers, taught English in San Salvador and students at the school in Muñoces. They continue to be involved in the community,

Warren and his wife enjoy hiking in the Rocky Mountains, travel in El Salvador and Canada.

Report of the 522nd Meeting of the Presbytery of Des Moines

The 522nd Stated Meeting of the Presbytery was held February 13, 2021 via Zoom. Rev. Meghan Davis-Brass, CP Linda Curtis-Stolper and Commissioner Mickey Van Baale were all in attendance. The meeting began at 10 am by Lynne Hanna, the new Moderator of the Presbytery. 72 people attended the meeting.

Annika Lister Stroope, new Administrative Executive and Stated Clerk, had some changes that will now be part of the meetings. The worship service will occur throughout the meeting rather than occurring all at one time. Also, there will be and were two 5-minute breaks.

Highlights of the meeting were:

- Reports from various committees.
 - <u>Leadership Council</u> two changes to the Manual of Operations were presented that covered whom would have voice and vote on the Leadership Council and that the outgoing Moderator of Presbytery would install the newly elected officers at the last stated meeting of the year. Both passed.
 - <u>Committee on Budget & Finance</u> a change to the Manual of Operations, stating in a three-year cycle, a review of the finances will be done on the second year and a full audit the third. This passed.
 - <u>Committee on Nominating</u> Names of people nominated to be on the Commission on Ministry (COM) were presented. They were elected.
 - <u>Personnel Commission</u>, of which Mickey is a member, indicated a six-month transition period is being held and Jeannie Stolee has been hired as Transitional Office Manager. She was introduced. The commission is responsible for finding the new office for UPP (United Presbyteries of the Plains), watching over the financial accounts of the UPP, and doing staff reviews, among other duties.
 - <u>Committee on Stewardship & Mission Education</u> Gave information on education opportunities and reminded everyone that General Mission pledges are due, and that Sessions can and are encouraged to vote on taking up the various special offerings at one time.
- The three Tri-Presbyteries Executives, Amgad Beblawi, Mission Executive; Ian McMullen,
 Pastor to the Presbyteries; and Annika Lister Stroope, Administrative Executive and Stated
 Clerk, were installed and each gave a short report on what they have been doing in the first
 month in the new positions.
- About halfway through the meeting, a very moving guided meditation was held based on Colossians 3:12-17. This served as the message of the worship service.

The meeting was adjourned, and Moderator Lynne Hanna offered a prayer and benediction. The meeting concluded a little before noon.

Mickey Van Baale Commissioner to Presbytery

(I personally find it interesting that when we met in person our meetings ran from 9 am to 3 pm, but over Zoom we are able to conduct all our business in just under two hours.)

What exactly is the per capita?

Every Presbyterian Church (USA) congregation is asked to pay a per-member assessment (per capita). Per capita is not membership dues. About thirteen years ago, the General Assembly approved the following definition of per capita: "Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian Church through the governing bodies to participate equally, responsibly, and independently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a reformed church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians." In short, per capita is the way churches share in the work of the wider church family: the Presbytery of Des Moines, General Assembly (national level) as well as the international mission. Assessing based on membership makes it equitable across churches. Some of each member's assessment goes to each level of governance: Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly.

It was voted at the November Presbytery meeting to leave the Per Capita assessment at \$45.00 per person for the year 2021. This is not per family, but per member of the church. Please make your check out to First Presbyterian Church and mark "per capita" in the memo section. In turn, our church will submit our assessments to the Presbytery.

The breakdown of the \$45 is as follows:

GA \$8.98

Synod \$5.50

Presbytery \$30.52
