Meghan's Musings

We Belong to Christ

As I write this month's "Musings," I am looking out over a beautiful, placid lake about 45 minutes before sunset. My sister's family including my beloved, wild and ruckus nephews have departed and I am gradually becoming accustomed to the peace and quiet which lured me here. And try as I might, I cannot forget the turmoil of current events, the contentious election season, the increasing polarization of our nation and our society, indeed even our world.

Of course, as I write, I do not know how the elections will go. I don't know if we'll even know who has won the presidential election come November 4 and if not, when will we know and even worse, if political tensions and crises will get worse, perhaps even violent, after the election. I try not to be an alarmist but I know there are many who fear the election could prompt actual armed conflicts.

And as I write this in mid-October, knowing you will be reading it shortly before the election or perhaps even after, what word of comfort might I offer? What is the Good News?

I was recently in a Zoom meeting in which my colleagues were discussing how we address these worries. How do we calm the anxiety that many of us are experiencing? What do we do or say on November 4 and the days/weeks/months following? And Rev. Barbara Gaddis, a retired pastor in our presbytery, made the point that what is most important to remember above all else is that we belong to Christ. No matter what. We don't belong to the Democratic or Republican party. We don't belong to Trump or Biden. We don't even belong to the United States of America, no matter how much we love our country or how patriotic we may be. Above all else we belong to Christ. Or, to paraphrase the Apostle Paul: there is no longer Red or Blue for we are all one in Christ Jesus. It is so obvious, we can easily overlook it.

And I am reminded of something another of my colleagues recently said. Her church was going to be making a decision regarding an issue that was somewhat contentious, indeed the congregation was leaning in a direction opposed to what she felt they should do. And she said, "I just keep reminding everyone that the Presbyterian way is: once a decision is made, we all come together on the same side to make it work."

My prayer for me, for you and for our whole country is that no matter what happens on November 3, that we would all do our part to come together on the same side to make it work. That we would all do our part to begin to heal the divisions that have been widening in recent years and decades. That we would all remember above all else that we belong to Christ. Amen. A prayer as I put on my mask:

Creator,

as I prepare to go into the world, help me to see the sacrament in the wearing of this cloth let it be "an outward sign of an inward grace" a tangible and visible way of living love for my neighbours, as I love myself.

Christ,

since my lips will be covered, uncover my heart, that people would see my smile in the crinkles around my eyes. Since my voice may be muffled, help me to speak clearly, not only with my words, but with my actions.

Holy Spirit, As the elastic touches my ears, remind me to listen carefully and full of care to all those I meet. May this simple piece of cloth be shield and banner, and each breath that it holds, be filled with your love. In your Name and in that love, I pray. May it be so. ~Richard Bott

Each year on World Food Day, we formally recognize all the Hunger Action Congregations. The list, available at <u>www.pcusa.org/haclist</u>, will be updated by World Food Day on October 16.

Special Presbytery Meeting

The Presbyteries of Prospect Hill, North Central Iowa, and Des Moines have voted to join together in calling three staff members to lead the presbyteries beginning January 1, 2021. The vote, which took place at a specially called joint meeting on October 10, approved the call and election of the following people:

- The Rev. Annika Lister Stroope to be Administrative Executive and Stated Clerk;
- The Rev. Ian McMullen to be Pastor to the Presbyteries.
- Ruling Elder Amgad Beblawi to be Mission Executive

The new staffing model is the culmination of a years-long process in which representatives of all three presbyteries met, at first informally, then with the formation of a task force to work out the details of the model, and finally with a search committee led by Rev. Ken Rummer of Des Moines Presbytery and including members from all three presbyteries. The process was guided throughout by Rev. Dr. Deb DeMeester, Director of Leadership Development for the Synod of Lakes and Prairies. Synod Executive Elona Street-Steward advised the search committee on process. At the October 10 meeting, which was held via Zoom, the three candidates had the opportunity to introduce themselves and answer questions from all participants.

An installation service will be held after the first of the year.

This is a bold, exciting step, not only for our three presbyteries, but for the denomination, and the rest of the church is already taking note of this new model for leadership. We ask your prayers for Annika, Amgad, and Ian as they prepare to take up their new responsibilities. Gratitude is also due to the many people from the presbyteries who volunteered their energy, intelligence, imagination, and love to the process.

They will share the 3 positions listed above, along with an Office Manager and Program and Communications Administrator and there will be only one centrally located office. The office staff of the Presbytery of Des Moines are eligible to apply for the two Administrative positions, but Nancy Lister-Settle and Betty Dyer are retiring and Kristin Pike has accepted a call to Community Presbyterian Church in Hartford.
