

Meghan's Musings

God is Doing a New Thing. But What?

Earlier this summer your Session sent out a letter that began, "Contemplative spirituality is often described as 'taking a long, loving, look at the real.' In doing so, we acknowledge the reality of a situation, even if it is difficult to do so, without denial or despair. In doing so, we seek to see a situation as God sees it, in attempt to understand where God is leading and pray for the courage to follow."

In our denomination, Presbyterian Church (USA), it is customary for congregations to engage in what's called a "Mission Study" when a pastor leaves, before even starting to look for a new pastor. The idea is for the congregation to assess areas such as: where they are as a church, their strengths and growth opportunities (a.k.a. weaknesses), where their community is, where they'd like to be, how they'd like to get there. Of course, how comprehensive the Mission Study is varies by congregation and the requirements of the Presbytery of which the church is a member. While Mission Studies are typically only conducted when churches are between installed pastors (and often grudgingly at the insistence of the Presbytery), churches change, communities change, needs change and therefore, most churches would benefit from conducting something akin to a Mission Study every 5 years or so.

Well, I've been here over seven years now and it's been at least eight years since Session has actively engaged the church family in these important conversations. Therefore, as Session continues the work of "a long, loving, look at the real" to discern God's leading for us in the coming months and years, it is crucial to include the wider church family in this discernment. In that spirit, members of Session are inviting each of you to a small group discussion to help us get a fuller picture of where we are as a church family, where we'd like to be in the future —both near and long term, and how we might get there.

Please note: the purpose of these discussions is not directly related to any conversations we are having with the UCC and Lutheran congregations about possible collaborations. Rather, before we enter into meaningful discernment with the other churches, we need a very clear picture of what our Mission is as First Presbyterian Church of Newton, Iowa, at this time.

Below are the dates, times and places that Session members will be hosting discussions (in their homes unless otherwise noted). Please contact Mickey at the church office to sign up for a time. In an effort to keep the groups small, each will have a limited number of participants and will be filled on a first come basis. David Alan Shannon, husband of Jeanette and father of Cathy Rickers, was born July 7, 1937, in Sioux City, Iowa. He died at his home on Sunday, August 8, 2021. Living in the Morningside area, he attended Longfellow, East Junior and East Senior High School. Dave attended the University of Iowa for 1 ½ years before joining the US Army, in the spring of 1957. Training at Fort Hood, TX, his group, the 4th Armored Division, was stationed in Furth, Germany for three years. He received an honorable discharge in March of 1960.

On April 3, 1961, Dave was united in marriage with Jeanette Lee Marsh in Sioux City. Dave and Jeanette had two children, Catherine and Patrick, of whom Dave was justifiably proud, as both have grown to be responsible and contributing members of society. After working for a TV repair shop, Dave started working for Zenith, at their radio assembly plant in Sioux City. While there, he did a variety of things, from "Peaking" IF cans, to repairing assembly line rejects, doing quality control, and working in the product development lab. In 1967, he joined Sperry Corp., as a computer technician, working for them as a group leader, field manager, financial manager and logistics (parts) manager, until his retirement in 1991. At this time the family moved from Sioux City to Lindenhurst, IL; Union Grove, WI; Ralston, NE; and Streamwood, IL. After retirement, he and Jeanette moved to Altoona and eventually to Newton, IA, to be closer to their daughter and grandchildren.

He devoted his life to his family, was active in Boy Scouts as a Webelo Leader, Scout Master and Committeeman for many years. He enjoyed working outdoors, he served on the Streamwood Golf Commission and was an avid, though average, golfer. He had a great love of history, especially World War II and the airplanes that were involved in that conflict. He was a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association. He attended the EEA Fantasy Flight camp in Oshkosh, WI, where he learned about and flew in the B-15 "Aluminum Overcast", which was a highlight of his life and love of WW II aircraft.

David died Sunday afternoon, August 8, 2021, at his home. Visitation with Dave's family was from 5pm until a service at 7pm, on Wednesday, August 11, 2021, at the Pence ~ Reese Funeral Home in Newton with Rev. Meghan Davis-Brass officiating. Burial was held at 2pm, Thursday, August 12, in the Omaha National Cemetery, in Omaha, Nebraska.

He was preceded in death by his parents; and a brother Mike Shannon. Those left to honor Dave's memory include his wife of 60 years, Jeanette; his daughter Catherine E. (Terry) Rickers; his son Patrick Shannon; his grandchildren: Staff Sgt. Brett (Ariel) Shannon, Nathan & Alex Shannon, Rachel (Ben) Anderson, Ahren Rickers; his great-grandchildren: Brooklyn & Kane Shannon and Lucas Bethards-Welch; his sister Mary Pat (Woody) Widrowicz; his sister-in-law Patty Shannon; his nieces and nephews; and his many extended family and friends

JoAnn Munger was born in our hospital on November 29. 1930 and grew up in the family home close to Sunset Park in Newton. Her mother. Aneta Gates. was a homemaker and father, Harry Vance worked for the Maytag Co. until his retirement. During her school years at Emerson Hough, Woodrow Wilson and at the old Central Junior High, JoAnn would walk with her father on his way to Maytag.

Her uncle Simon Gates who was 10 years older lived with the family and was almost like an older brother to her. While still a student she worked at the Capitol Theater and helped out with "Bank Night" on Saturdays. As a student her favorite subject was Office Practices and was able to gain experience working at Maytag as part of her school assignments. She also had a desire to be a nurse but that was never realized. JoAnn worked 30 years as a secretary in the school district which included the School Board.

JoAnn remembers the attack on Pearl Harbor at the start of World War 2 and the Presidency of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. During this time rationing was required of many items, particularly of gasoline. Her uncle Simon, although married, was drafted into the Army where he served in the Philippines.

JoAnn's family was small but they made time to be together. Every Sunday all went to church and then got together to eat and visit but everyone departed by 4:00 to get home to do farm chores. Since few people had TV in the early 1950s, on Saturday evenings folks would gather for a couple of hours to watch WOI., which she believes was probably the news in black & white... nothing like the slick color programs we enjoy these days.

ENDING HUNGER ONE STEP AT A TIME

The annual Jasper County CROP Hunger Walk will be held on Sunday, October 3. This event, sponsored by Church World Service since 1969, gives people from many ages, faiths and backgrounds a way to show global solidarity with the millions who walk miles every day in search of food and water. In this year of continuing pandemic impacts and millions being displaced by fighting in many parts of the world, hunger issues are widespread and critical. Donations to support this event will be used to support hunger-fighting organizations around the world and in Jasper County.

Registration for walkers will start at 1:30 pm on the west Courthouse lawn, with the walk beginning at 2:00. The route is approximately three miles in length. Walkers may collect sponsors, who give a predetermined amount per mile walked or an overall donation – if you wish to do this, please contact Linda Curtis-Stolper (641-840-2417) for a Walker Donation Envelope. Walkers and others may also give donations directly by making checks payable to First Presbyterian Church and designating "CROP Walk" in the memo line.

Our church has a history of very generous support of this event. Please look at the food you have on hand in your home, reflect on how you go about obtaining more to eat, and compare your process with what many others experience. One in nine people worldwide lack access to clean water and a healthy diet. We can provide financial resources to help organizations on the ground address these needs. 
